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13	NEW SECTION. Section 1. Continuous eligibility for young children enrolled in healthy				
14	Montana kids plan programs legislative findings and purpose direction to department of public				
15	health and human services. (1) The legislature finds that Montana voters approved a ballot initiative in 2008				
16	to create the healthy Montana kids plan, which coordinated access to health coverage for children enrolled in				
17	the Montana medicaid program and the children's health insurance program and increased eligibility standards				
18	for those programs.				
19	(2) The legislature further finds that fluctuations in family income can result in a child being				
20	disenrolled and subsequently reenrolled in the programs making up the healthy Montana kids plan multiple				
21	times before the child reaches 19 years of age.				
22	(3) The legislature further finds that continuous eligibility for healthy Montana kids plan enrollees				
23	under 6 years of age:				
24	(a) will provide consistent, predictable access to health care services at a time of critical early				
25	childhood development;				
26	(b) will improve health outcomes by providing children with ongoing preventive care and by				
27	preventing gaps in care that can occur when a family loses coverage and cannot afford necessary health care				
28	services, including medications;

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1 (c) may reduce the costs of health care services by allowing children to receive the right level of 2 care at the right time in the right setting and by lessening the chances that they will need emergency care or 3 treatment for conditions that have worsened because of a lack of care; and 4 (d) may improve a child's readiness for school because regular, preventive care may identify 5 physical, behavioral, and developmental concerns that can be addressed before the conditions affect school 6 performance. 7 (4) The legislature further finds that providing continuous eligibility until the child reaches 6 years of 8 age will reduce administrative costs for the department of public health and human services by reducing the 9 need to redetermine a child's eligibility for renewed or continued coverage under the healthy Montana kids plan. 10 (5) It is the purpose of the legislature to allow children enrolled in both the medicaid-funded and 11 children's health insurance program-funded portions portion of the healthy Montana kids plan to remain enrolled 12 in those programs the program until 6 years of age even if a change in family circumstances occurs that would 13 otherwise make the children ineligible for the programs. It is the purpose of the legislature to allow children in the children's health insurance program-14 15 funded portion of the healthy Montana kids plan to: 16 remain in that program until 6 years of age even if a change in family circumstances occurs that 17 would otherwise make the children ineligible for the program if, at the time of initial enrollment, family income 18 was at or below 200% of the federal poverty guidelines; and 19

- (b) require annual eligibility determinations for children with family incomes above 200% of the
   federal poverty guidelines.
  - (7) The department of public health and human services:
  - (a) shall notify families with incomes above 200% of the federal poverty guidelines of the need to reapply for the healthy Montana kids plan; and
    - (b) may conduct audits to ensure compliance with this section.
  - (6)(8) The legislature directs the department of public health and human services to apply to the centers for medicare and medicaid services for the necessary waivers to allow for continuous eligibility <u>as</u>

    provided in this section for children enrolled in the programs making up the healthy Montana kids plan through the end of the month in which a child attains 6 years of age. Among other things, the department's research and

2	(a) whether ongoing enrollment will:				
3	(i) reduce the percentage of children under 6 years of age who are disenrolled and reenrolled				
4	the programs making up the healthy Montana kids plan;				
5	(ii) increase the number of enrollees participating in well-baby and well-child visits, including				
6	developmental assessments to the extent those assessments can be quantified; and				
7	(iii) reduce the average monthly cost of services provided to enrollees under 6 years of age; and				
8	(b) whether continuous eligibility will reduce administrative costs for the department.				
9	(7)(9) The department shall:				
10	(a) notify the appropriate interim or standing committees of the legislature of the centers for				
11	medicare and medicaid services' decisions on the waivers within 30 days of the date the decisions are made;

13	(b)	if a waiver request is	approved, implement cont	inuous eligibility for children covered by the	
14	waiver decision no later than January 1, 2024.
