16	BE IT ENACTE	ED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

18	NEW S	SECTION. Section 1. Purpose. The purpose of [this act] is to build a behavioral health system
19	that serves all	Montanans and that supports people to remain in their homes and, when not possible, in their
20	communities.	
21		
22	<u>NEW S</u>	<u>SECTION.</u> Section 2. Behavioral health system for future generations advisory
23	commission. (1) There is a behavioral health system for future generations advisory commission.
24	(2)	The advisory commission consists of:
25	(a)	two senators, one from the majority party and one from the minority party, appointed by the
26	committee on c	ommittees;
27	(b)	two representatives, one from the majority party and one from the minority party, appointed by
28	the speaker of	the house; and

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1	(c)	three members, including the director of the department of public health	ו and human services,	

2	appointed by t	he governor.
3	(3)	For legislative appointments, legislators serving as members of the legislative finance
4	committee, the	e health and human services interim budget committee provided for in 5-12-501, and the children,
5	families, health	n, and human services interim committee from the 2025 biennium are given preference.
6	(4)	Appointed members of the advisory commission must be compensated and receive travel
7	expenses as p	rovided for in 2-15-124 for each day in attendance at commission meetings or in the performance
8	of any duty or	service as a commission member.
9	(5)	The department of public health and human services shall staff the advisory commission.
10	(6)	The advisory commission shall elect a chair from the legislative branch. The director of the
11	department of	public health and human services shall serve as the vice chair.
12		
13	NEW :	SECTION. Section 3. Commission meetings recommendations. (1) The advisory
14	commission sh	nall recommend to the 69th legislature how funds allocated to the department of public health and
15	human service	es through the state special revenue fund established in [section 3] [section 4] are expended.
16	(2)	The advisory commission shall hold its first meeting no later than August 1, 2023, and set its
17	future meeting	dates.
18	(3)	The advisory commission shall reserve time at each commission meeting for stakeholder
19	engagement a	nd public comment. Public participation is encouraged.
20	(4)	The advisory commission shall submit a report of its recommendations to the office of budget
21	and program p	planning and to the legislative fiscal analyst by May 1, 2024. The report must include the
22	following:	
23	(a)	initiatives that address behavioral health stabilize behavioral health and developmental
24	disabilities ser	vice providers and delivery;
25	(b)	initiatives that assist those with developmental disabilities increase service capacity to meet
26	identified beha	vioral health and developmental disabilities services demands;
27	<u>(c)</u>	initiatives that increase opportunities for Montanans to receive integrated physical and
28	behavioral hea	alth care; and



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1	(c) (d)	the amount of funding required for the initiatives.
2	(5)	Within 60 days of submitting its recommendations to the office of budget and program planning
3	and the legisla	tive fiscal analyst, the advisory commission, in cooperation with the department of public health
4	and human se	rvices, shall present the recommendations to the following legislative committees, who shall meet
5	jointly:	
6	(a)	the legislative finance committee;
7	(b)	the health and human services interim budget committee provided for in 5-12-501;-and
8	(c)	the children, families, health, and human services interim committee;
9	<u>(d)</u>	the judicial branch, law enforcement, and justice interim budget committee provided for in 5-12-
10	<u>501; and</u>	
11	<u>(e)</u>	the long-range planning interim budget committee provided for in 5-12-501.
12	(6)	(a) Following the presentation before the joint meeting of the three committees the advisory
13	commission sh	all meet to consider the comments from committee members and the public and may revise or
14	amend its reco	ommendations, if desired.
15	(b)	The final recommendations of the advisory commission must be transmitted to the governor by
16	the office of bu	dget and program planning for consideration by the governor only after the commission has met
17	to consider the	comments from committee members and the public pursuant to subsection (6)(a), and the
18	governor may	include the final recommendations in the executive budget for the 2027 biennium.
19	<u>(c)</u>	The final recommendations of the commission may be transmitted to all members of the 69th
20	legislature.	
21	<u>(7)</u>	Any of the following committees may draft proposed legislation based on the recommendations
22	of the commiss	<u>sion:</u>
23	<u>(a)</u>	the legislative finance committee;
24	<u>(b)</u>	the health and human services interim budget committee provided for in 5-12-501;
25	<u>(c)</u>	the children, families, health, and human services interim committee;
26	<u>(d)</u>	the judicial branch, law enforcement, and justice interim budget committee provided for in 5-12-
27	<u>501; or</u>	
28	<u>(e)</u>	the long-range planning interim budget committee provided for in 5-12-501.



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1 (7)The governor may modify recommendations and must provide the list of approved 2 recommendations and amounts to the advisory commission, the office of budget and program planning, the 3 department of public health and human services, and to the health and human services interim budget committee. If the governor modifies the list of recommendations and amounts submitted by the advisory 4 5 commission, the department of public health and human services shall report and explain the change to the 6 advisory commission and to the health and human services interim budget committee at the next scheduled 7 meetings. 8 (8) If the governor later determines that a recommended initiative cannot be completed, the 9 governor may authorize a different initiative. Prior to implementing a different initiative, the department of public health and human services shall present a report on the new initiative to both the advisory commission and the 10 11 health and human services interim budget committee. 12 At any time during the process outlined in this section, if a legislator does not approve of the (9) recommended initiatives or the amounts for funding, the legislator may initiate the provisions of 5-3-105 to 13 request a poll of the legislature to hold a special session. 14 15 16 NEW SECTION. Section 4. Behavioral health system for future generations fund. (1) There is an 17 account in the state special revenue fund established in 17-2-102 to be known as the behavioral health system 18 for future generations fund. There must be deposited in the account money received from legislative general fund transfers. 19 (2) 20 (3) Eligible uses of the fund include: 21 (a) medicaid and CHIP matching funds for payments made to address state behavioral health 22 settings; 23 (b) medicaid and CHIP matching funds for payments made to state intermediate care facilities for 24 individuals with intellectual disabilities for services to assist those with developmental and intellectual 25 disabilities; and 26 (c) statewide community-based investments to stabilize behavioral health and developmental 27 disabilities service providers and delivery, increase and strengthen the behavioral health and developmental 28 disabilities workforce, increase service capacity to meet identified behavioral health and developmental



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1	disabilities services demands, and increase opportunities for Montanans to receive integrated physical and
2	behavioral healthcare health care.;
3	(d) acquisition of new or remodeling of existing infrastructure or property to support the
4	establishment of state behavioral health settings and state intermediate care facilities for individuals with
5	intellectual disabilities;
6	(e) planning, operation, or other contract expenses associated with state intermediate care
7	facilities for individuals with intellectual disabilities;
8	(f) planning, operation, or other contract expenses associated with state behavioral health
9	settings; and
10	(g) studying and planning of the development of a comprehensive behavioral health system.
11	
12	NEW SECTION. Section 5. Transfer of funds. (1) No later than June 30, 2023, the state treasurer
13	shall transfer <u>\$225 \$300</u> million from the general fund to the account established in [section 3] [section 4].
14	(2) No later than June 30, 2023, the state treasurer shall transfer \$75 million from the general fund
15	to the capital developments long-range building program account provided for in 17-7-209.
16	
17	NEW SECTION. Section 5. Appropriations. (1) There is appropriated \$40 million to the department
18	of public health and human services on passage and approval of [this act] through the biennium beginning July
19	1, 2023, from the account established in [section 3] to pay for eligible uses identified in [section 3].
20	(2) There is appropriated \$30 million to the department of public health and human services for the
21	fiscal year beginning July 1, 2024, from the account established in [section 3] to pay for eligible uses identified
22	in [section 3].
23	(3) Any funds remaining in the fund established in [section 3] are subject to legislative
24	appropriation.
25	
26	NEW SECTION. Section 6. Appropriation for capital projects. (1) No later than July 1, 2024, and
27	only after the advisory commission transmits its recommendations to the governor after following the process
28	set forth in [section 2], there is appropriated \$75 million to the department of administration from the capital



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1	developments long-range building program account in the capital projects fund type provided for in 17-7-209 for
2	the behavioral health system for future generations capital development.
3	(2) (a) Pursuant to 17-7-210, if construction of a new facility requires an immediate or future
4	increase in state funding for program expansion or operations and maintenance, the legislature may not
5	authorize the new facility unless it also appropriates funds for the increase in state funding for program
6	expansion and operations and maintenance. To the extent allowed by law, at the end of each fiscal year
7	following approval of a new facility but prior to receipt of its certificate of occupancy, the appropriation made in
8	subsection (3) reverts to its originating fund. The appropriation is not subject to the provisions of 17-7-304.
9	(b) It is the legislature's intent that the appropriation in subsection (3) become part of the
10	respective agency's base budget for the biennium beginning July 1, 2025.
11	(3) The amount of \$1,661,426 is appropriated for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, to the
12	department of public health and human services from the account established in [section 3] for program
13	expansion or operations and maintenance for the indicated new facility.
14	
15	NEW SECTION. Section 7. Planning and design. The department of administration may proceed
16	with the planning and design of capital projects in [section 6] prior to the receipt of other funding sources. The
17	department may use interentity loans in accordance with 17-2-107 to pay planning and design costs incurred
18	before the receipt of other funding sources.
19	
20	NEW SECTION. Section 8. Review by department of environmental quality. The department of
21	environmental quality shall review capital projects authorized in [section 6] for potential inclusion in the state
22	building energy conservation program under Title 90, chapter 4, part 6. When a review shows that a capital
23	project will result in energy or utility savings and improvements, that project must be submitted to the energy
24	conservation program for funding consideration by the state building energy conservation program. Funding
25	provided under the energy conservation program guidelines must be used to offset or add to the authorized
26	funding for the project, and the amount must be dependent on the annual utility savings resulting from the
27	capital project. The department of public health and human services must be notified of potential funding after
28	the review and is obligated to utilize the state building energy conservation program funding, if available.

2	NEW SECTION. Section 9. Legislative consent. The appropriation authorized in [section 6]
3	constitutes legislative consent for the capital project contained in [section 6] within the meaning of 18-2-102.
4	
5	NEW SECTION. Section 6. Appropriation. There is appropriated \$100,000 from the general fund to
6	the department of public health and human services for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, to staff the
7	behavioral health system for future generations commission.
8	
9	NEW SECTION. Section 7. Codification instruction. [Section 3] [Section 4] is intended to be
10	codified as an integral part of Title 50, chapter 1, part 1, and the provisions of Title 50, chapter 1, part 1, apply
11	to [section 3] [section 4].
12	
13	NEW SECTION. Section 8. Effective date. [This act] is effective on passage and approval.
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15	NEW SECTION. Section 9. Termination. [Sections 1 and 2] [Sections 2 and 3] terminate July 1,
16	2025.
