4 A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT REVISING MARIJUANA LAWS; PROHIBITING THE
5 MANUFACTURE AND DISTRIBUTION OF SYNTHETIC MARIJUANA PRODUCTS; PROVIDING
6 DEFINITIONS; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT BY DEPARTMENTS AND LAW ENFORCEMENT;
7 PROVIDING FOR RESTRICTIONS BY LOCAL GOVERNMENTS; CLARIFYING UNLAWFUL
8 TRANSACTIONS REGARDING THE DISTRIBUTION OF SYNTHETIC MARIJUANA PRODUCTS TO
9 CHILDREN; CLARIFYING THE OFFENSE OF ALTERING A LABEL ON DANGEROUS DRUGS; REQUIRING
10 PUBLIC REPORTING OF VIOLATIONS; CREATING A TEMPORARY ADVISORY COUNCIL; ESTABLISHING
11 REPORTING REQUIREMENTS; PROVIDING AN APPROPRIATION; AMENDING SECTIONS 16-12-101, 16-
12 12-102, 16-12-108, 16-12-125, 16-12-208, 45-5-623, 45-9-105, 50-32-222, AND 80-18-101, MCA; AND
13 PROVIDING AN IMMEDIATE EFFECTIVE DATE AND A TERMINATION DATE."

15 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:

16
17 **NEW SECTION. Section 1. Synthetic marijuana products prohibited -- restriction on sale of**
18 **marijuana products.** (1) A person may not manufacture, process, or offer for sale a synthetic marijuana
19 product.

20 (2) Products containing or consisting of cannabinoids produced and processed for any type of
21 consumption into a human body, whether marketed as containing or consisting of cannabinoids or not, that
22 exceed a THC concentration of 0.3% may only be sold by a manufacturer licensed under 16-12-222 or a
23 dispensary licensed under 16-12-224 unless the products are authorized as a drug by the United States food
24 and drug administration. Products under this section may not exceed the potency levels established in 16-12-
25 224.

26 (3) Products containing a THC concentration of 0.3% or less sold by any person other than a
27 licensed manufacturer under 16-12-222 or a licensed dispensary under 16-12-224 ~~must contain at least a 20:1~~
28 ~~ratio of cannabidiol or other non-THC cannabinoids to THC and may not exceed 2~~ 0.5 milligrams of THC for

1 each serving AND MAY NOT EXCEED 2 MILLIGRAMS PER PACKAGE.

2 (4) This section does not apply to unadulterated hemp flower that is not further processed into
3 extracts, infused products, or concentrates.

4
5 NEW SECTION. Section 2. Enforcement -- ordinances -- investigations -- INJUNCTIONS --
6 violation. (1) A local government may, by ordinance or otherwise, impose regulations regarding products under
7 [section 1(1) and (3)].

8 (2) The department of agriculture, the department of justice, the department of public health and
9 human services, local sheriff departments, municipal police departments, A COUNTY ATTORNEY'S OFFICE, and the
10 department of revenue may inspect any business to investigate unlawful activity under [section 1(1)].

11 (3) (A) IF AN INVESTIGATION RESULTS IN REASONABLE CAUSE TO BELIEVE THAT A VIOLATION OF [SECTION
12 1] OCCURRED, THE INVESTIGATING AGENCY MAY ISSUE A CEASE AND DESIST ORDER TO BE SERVED PURSUANT TO RULE
13 4, M.R.CIV.P. THE ORDER IS EFFECTIVE UPON SERVICE. PROOF OF SERVICE CONSTITUTES NOTICE TO THE PERSON OF
14 THE EXISTENCE AND CONTENTS OF THE ORDER.

15 (B) THE INVESTIGATING AGENCY MAY ASSESS A PENALTY OF NOT MORE THAN \$1,000 PER DAY FOR EACH
16 DAY A CEASE AND DESIST ORDER ISSUED UNDER THIS SECTION IS VIOLATED. FIFTY PERCENT OF THE PENALTY MUST BE
17 DEPOSITED INTO THE HEALING AND ENDING ADDICTION THROUGH RECOVERY AND TREATMENT ACCOUNT UNDER 16-12-
18 122, AND THE REMAINDER MUST BE DEPOSITED IN THE MARIJUANA STATE SPECIAL REVENUE ACCOUNT UNDER 16-12-
19 111.

20 (4) (A) THE INVESTIGATING AGENCY MAY INSTITUTE AND MAINTAIN IN THE NAME OF THE STATE AN ACTION
21 FOR INJUNCTION OR ANOTHER CIVIL REMEDY IN DISTRICT COURT TO ENFORCE A CEASE AND DESIST ORDER UNDER THIS
22 SECTION. PROOF OF INADEQUACY OF A LEGAL REMEDY OR PROOF OF SUBSTANTIAL OR IRREPARABLE DAMAGE FROM
23 CONTINUED VIOLATION IS NOT REQUIRED. IT IS SUFFICIENT TO CHARGE THAT THE PERSON ENGAGED IN THE UNLAWFUL
24 CONDUCT SUBJECT TO [SECTION 1] ON A CERTAIN DAY IN A CERTAIN COUNTY WITHOUT AVERRING FURTHER OR MORE
25 PARTICULAR FACTS CONCERNING THE VIOLATION.

26 (B) THE DEPARTMENT IS ENTITLED TO ITS COSTS, INCLUDING THE COSTS OF INVESTIGATION AND
27 ATTORNEY FEES, INCURRED IN SEEKING A DISTRICT COURT ORDER UNDER THIS SECTION.

28 (C) A PERSON WHO KNOWINGLY OR PURPOSELY VIOLATES A DISTRICT COURT INJUNCTION UNDER THIS

1 SECTION IS GUILTY OF A FELONY AND SUBJECT TO THE PENALTIES SET FORTH IN 46-18-213.

2 (5) AN OFFICER, AGENT, PARTNER, OR MEMBER OF A BUSINESS ENTITY WHO KNOWINGLY AND PERSONALLY

3 PARTICIPATES IN A VIOLATION OF THIS SECTION IS SUBJECT TO THE PENALTIES PRESCRIBED IN THIS SECTION.

4 (6) THE REMEDIES PROVIDED FOR IN THIS SECTION ARE IN ADDITION TO AND DO NOT LIMIT THE REMEDIES

5 AND ACTIONS OTHERWISE PERMITTED OR REQUIRED BY LAW.

6 ~~(3)~~(7) A violation of [section 1(1)] may be enforced under:

- 7 (a) criminal distribution of dangerous drugs as defined in 45-9-101;
- 8 (b) criminal possession of dangerous drugs as defined in 45-9-102; or
- 9 (c) criminal production or manufacture of dangerous drugs as defined in 45-9-110.

11 NEW SECTION. Section 3. Synthetic marijuana products advisory council. (1) The department
12 of revenue shall establish a synthetic marijuana products advisory council in accordance with 2-15-122 that is
13 composed of the following members:

- 14 (a) one member from the department of agriculture;
- 15 (b) one member from the department of justice;
- 16 (c) one member from the department of public health and human services;
- 17 (d) one member from the department of revenue;
- 18 (e) one member from the board of pharmacy;
- 19 (f) two members from the marijuana industry; and
- 20 (g) one public member. The public member must have expertise in:
 - 21 (i) toxicology;
 - 22 (ii) organic chemistry; or
 - 23 (iii) regulatory affairs in nutraceutical, pharmaceutical, or dietary supplements.

24 (2) The department shall provide staff and support services for the advisory council.

25 (3) Members are entitled to reimbursement for travel expenses as provided in 2-18-501 through 2-
26 18-503.

27 (4) The advisory council shall review available research, data, and regulations of other jurisdictions
28 related to synthetic marijuana products, including but not limited to:

1 (a) definitions of the term "impairing" in relation to cannabinoids, as well as definitions of the terms
2 "artificial cannabinoids" and "synthetically derived cannabinoids"; and

3 (b) recommendations on potential guidelines for safe methods of manufacturing, extracting, and
4 synthesizing cannabinoids, including the sale of synthetic marijuana products.

5 (5) The advisory committee shall compile findings and make recommendations in a report to the
6 economic affairs interim committee, in accordance with 5-11-210, regarding regulating synthetic marijuana
7 products in the adult-use marijuana market by September 15, 2024.

9 **Section 4.** Section 16-12-101, MCA, is amended to read:

10 **"16-12-101. Short title -- purpose.** (1) This chapter may be cited as the "Montana Marijuana
11 Regulation and Taxation Act".

12 (2) The purpose of this chapter is to:

13 (a) provide for legal possession and use of limited amounts of marijuana legal for adults 21 years
14 of age or older;

15 (b) provide for the licensure and regulation of the cultivation, manufacture, production, distribution,
16 transportation, and sale of marijuana and marijuana products;

17 (c) eliminate the illicit market for marijuana and marijuana products;

18 (d) prevent the manufacture and distribution of synthetic marijuana products;

19 ~~(d)~~(e) prevent the distribution of marijuana sold under this chapter to persons under 21 years of age;

20 ~~(e)~~(f) ensure the safety of marijuana and marijuana products;

21 ~~(f)~~(g) ensure the security of licensed premises;

22 ~~(g)~~(h) establish reporting requirements for licensees;

23 ~~(h)~~(i) establish inspection requirements for licensees, including data collection on energy use,
24 chemical use, water use, and packaging waste to ensure a clean and healthy environment;

25 ~~(i)~~(j) provide for the testing of marijuana and marijuana products by licensed testing laboratories;

26 ~~(j)~~(k) give local governments authority to allow for the operation of marijuana businesses in their
27 community and establishing standards for the cultivation, manufacture, and sale of marijuana that protect the
28 public health, safety, and welfare of residents within their jurisdictions;

1 ~~(k)~~(l) tax the sale of marijuana and marijuana products to provide compensation for the economic
2 and social costs of marijuana;

3 ~~(j)~~(m) authorize courts to resentence persons who are currently serving sentences for acts that are
4 permitted under this chapter or for which the penalty is reduced by this chapter and to redesignate or expunge
5 those offenses from the criminal records of persons who have completed their sentences as set forth in this
6 chapter; and

7 ~~(m)~~(n) preserve and protect Montana's well-established hemp industry by drawing a clear distinction
8 between those participants and programs and the participants and programs associated with the marijuana
9 industry.

10 (3) Marijuana and marijuana products are not agricultural products, and the cultivation, processing,
11 manufacturing or selling of marijuana or marijuana products is not considered agriculture subject to regulation
12 by the department of agriculture unless expressly provided."

13

14 **Section 5.** Section 16-12-102, MCA, is amended to read:

15 **"16-12-102. Definitions.** As used in this chapter, the following definitions apply:

16 (1) "Adult-use dispensary" means a licensed premises from which a person licensed by the
17 department may:

18 (a) obtain marijuana or marijuana products from a licensed cultivator, manufacturer, dispensary, or
19 other licensee approved under this chapter; and

20 (b) sell marijuana or marijuana products to registered cardholders, adults that are 21 years of age
21 or older, or both.

22 (2) "Affiliate" means a person that directly, or indirectly through one or more intermediaries,
23 controls or is controlled by, or is under common control with, another person.

24 (3) "Beneficial owner of", "beneficial ownership of", or "beneficially owns an" is determined in
25 accordance with section 13(d) of the federal Securities and Exchange Act of 1934, as amended.

26 (4) "Canopy" means the total amount of square footage dedicated to live plant production at a
27 licensed premises consisting of the area of the floor, platform, or means of support or suspension of the plant.

28 (5) "Consumer" means a person 21 years of age or older who obtains or possesses marijuana or

1 marijuana products for personal use from a licensed dispensary but not for resale.

2 (6) "Control", "controls", "controlled", "controlling", "controlled by", and "under common control
3 with" mean the possession, direct or indirect, of the power to direct or cause the direction of the management or
4 policies of a person, whether through the ownership of voting owner's interests, by contract, or otherwise.

5 (7) "Controlling beneficial owner" means a person that satisfies one or more of the following:

6 (a) is a natural person, an entity that is organized under the laws of and for which its principal
7 place of business is located in one of the states or territories of the United States or District of Columbia, or a
8 publicly traded corporation, and:

9 (i) acting alone or acting in concert, owns or acquires beneficial ownership of 5% or more of the
10 owner's interest of a marijuana business;

11 (ii) is an affiliate that controls a marijuana business and includes, without limitation, any manager;

12 or

13 (iii) is otherwise in a position to control the marijuana business; or

14 (b) is a qualified institutional investor acting alone or acting in concert that owns or acquires
15 beneficial ownership of more than 15% of the owner's interest of a marijuana business.

16 (8) "Correctional facility or program" means a facility or program that is described in 53-1-202(2) or
17 (3) and to which an individual may be ordered by any court of competent jurisdiction.

18 (9) "Cultivator" means a person licensed by the department to:

19 (a) plant, cultivate, grow, harvest, and dry marijuana; and

20 (b) package and relabel marijuana produced at the location in a natural or naturally dried form that
21 has not been converted, concentrated, or compounded for sale through a licensed dispensary.

22 (10) "Debilitating medical condition" means:

23 (a) cancer, glaucoma, positive status for human immunodeficiency virus, or acquired immune
24 deficiency syndrome when the condition or disease results in symptoms that seriously and adversely affect the
25 patient's health status;

26 (b) cachexia or wasting syndrome;

27 (c) severe chronic pain that is a persistent pain of severe intensity that significantly interferes with
28 daily activities as documented by the patient's treating physician;

- 1 (d) intractable nausea or vomiting;
- 2 (e) epilepsy or an intractable seizure disorder;
- 3 (f) multiple sclerosis;
- 4 (g) Crohn's disease;
- 5 (h) painful peripheral neuropathy;
- 6 (i) a central nervous system disorder resulting in chronic, painful spasticity or muscle spasms;
- 7 (j) admittance into hospice care in accordance with rules adopted by the department; or
- 8 (k) posttraumatic stress disorder.
- 9 (11) "Department" means the department of revenue provided for in 2-15-1301.
- 10 (12) (a) "Employee" means an individual employed to do something for the benefit of an employer.
- 11 (b) The term includes a manager, agent, or director of a partnership, association, company,
- 12 corporation, limited liability company, or organization.
- 13 (c) The term does not include a third party with whom a licensee has a contractual relationship.
- 14 (13) (a) "Financial interest" means a legal or beneficial interest that entitles the holder, directly or
- 15 indirectly through a business, an investment, or a spouse, parent, or child relationship, to 5% or more of the net
- 16 profits or net worth of the entity in which the interest is held.
- 17 (b) The term does not include interest held by a bank or licensed lending institution or a security
- 18 interest, lien, or encumbrance but does include holders of private loans or convertible securities.
- 19 (14) "Former medical marijuana licensee" means a person that was licensed by or had an
- 20 application for licensure pending with the department of public health and human services to provide marijuana
- 21 to individuals with debilitating medical conditions on November 3, 2020.
- 22 (15) (a) "Indoor cultivation facility" means an enclosed area used to grow live plants that is within a
- 23 permanent structure using artificial light exclusively or to supplement natural sunlight.
- 24 (b) The term may include:
- 25 (i) a greenhouse;
- 26 (ii) a hoop house; or
- 27 (iii) a similar structure that protects the plants from variable temperature, precipitation, and wind.
- 28 (16) "Licensed premises" means all locations related to, or associated with, a specific license that is

1 authorized under this chapter and includes all enclosed public and private areas at the location that are used in
2 the business operated pursuant to a license, including offices, kitchens, restrooms, and storerooms.

3 (17) "Licensee" means a person holding a state license issued pursuant to this chapter.

4 (18) "Local government" means a county, a consolidated government, or an incorporated city or
5 town.

6 (19) "Manufacturer" means a person licensed by the department to convert or compound marijuana
7 into marijuana products, marijuana concentrates, or marijuana extracts and package, repackage, label, or
8 relabel marijuana products as allowed under this chapter.

9 (20) (a) "Marijuana" means all plant material from the genus Cannabis containing
10 tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) or seeds of the genus capable of germination.

11 (b) ~~The term does not include hemp, including any part of that plant, including the seeds and all~~
12 ~~derivatives, extracts, cannabinoids, isomers, acids, salts, and salts of isomers, whether growing or not, with a~~
13 ~~delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of not more than 0.3% on a dry weight basis, or commodities or~~
14 ~~products manufactured with hemp, or any other ingredient combined with marijuana to prepare topical or oral~~
15 ~~administrations, food, drink, or other products as provided in 80-18-101.~~

16 (c) The term does not include synthetic marijuana products.

17 ~~(e)(d)~~ The term does not include a drug approved by the United States food and drug administration
18 pursuant to section 505 of the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act, 21 U.S.C. 301, et seq.

19 (21) "Marijuana business" means a cultivator, manufacturer, adult-use dispensary, medical
20 marijuana dispensary, combined-use marijuana licensee, testing laboratory, marijuana transporter, or any other
21 business or function that is licensed by the department under this chapter.

22 (22) "Marijuana concentrate" means any type of marijuana product consisting wholly or in part of the
23 resin extracted from any part of the marijuana plant.

24 (23) "Marijuana derivative" means any mixture or preparation of the dried leaves, flowers, resin, or
25 byproducts of the marijuana plant, including but not limited to marijuana concentrates and other marijuana
26 products.

27 (24) "Marijuana product" means a product that contains marijuana and is intended for use by a
28 consumer by a means other than smoking. The term includes but is not limited to edible products, ointments,

1 tinctures, marijuana derivatives, and marijuana concentrates.

2 (25) "Marijuana transporter" means a person that is licensed to transport marijuana and marijuana
3 products from one marijuana business to another marijuana business, or to and from a testing laboratory, and
4 to temporarily store the transported retail marijuana and retail marijuana products at its licensed premises, but
5 is not authorized to sell marijuana or marijuana products to consumers under any circumstances.

6 (26) "Mature marijuana plant" means a harvestable marijuana plant.

7 (27) "Medical marijuana" means marijuana or marijuana products that are for sale solely to a
8 cardholder who is registered under Title 16, chapter 12, part 5.

9 (28) "Medical marijuana dispensary" means the location from which a registered cardholder may
10 obtain marijuana or marijuana products.

11 (29) "Outdoor cultivation" means live plants growing in an area exposed to natural sunlight and
12 environmental conditions including variable temperature, precipitation, and wind.

13 (30) "Owner's interest" means the shares of stock in a corporation, a membership in a nonprofit
14 corporation, a membership interest in a limited liability company, the interest of a member in a cooperative or in
15 a limited cooperative association, a partnership interest in a limited partnership, a partnership interest in a
16 partnership, and the interest of a member in a limited partnership association.

17 (31) "Paraphernalia" has the meaning provided for "drug paraphernalia" in 45-10-101.

18 (32) "Passive beneficial owner" means any person acquiring an owner's interest in a marijuana
19 business that is not otherwise a controlling beneficial owner or in control.

20 (33) "Person" means an individual, partnership, association, company, corporation, limited liability
21 company, or organization.

22 (34) "Qualified institutional investor" means:

23 (a) a bank or banking institution including any bank, trust company, member bank of the federal
24 reserve system, bank and trust company, stock savings bank, or mutual savings bank that is organized and
25 doing business under the laws of this state, any other state, or the laws of the United States;

26 (b) a bank holding company as defined in 32-1-109;

27 (c) a company organized as an insurance company whose primary and predominant business
28 activity is the writing of insurance or the reinsuring of risks underwritten by insurance companies, and that is

1 subject to regulation or oversight by the insurance department of the office of the state auditor or a similar
2 agency of another state, or any receiver or similar official or any liquidating agent for such a company, in their
3 capacity as such an insurance company;

4 (d) an investment company registered under section 8 of the federal Investment Company Act of
5 1940, as amended;

6 (e) an employee benefit plan or pension fund subject to the federal Employee Retirement Income
7 Security Act of 1974, excluding an employee benefit plan or pension fund sponsored by a licensee or an
8 intermediary holding company licensee that directly or indirectly owns 10% or more of a licensee;

9 (f) a state or federal government pension plan; or

10 (g) any other entity identified by rule by the department.

11 (35) "Registered cardholder" or "cardholder" means a Montana resident with a debilitating medical
12 condition who has received and maintains a valid registry identification card.

13 (36) "Registry identification card" means a document issued by the department pursuant to 16-12-
14 503 that identifies an individual as a registered cardholder.

15 (37) (a) "Resident" means an individual who meets the requirements of 1-1-215.

16 (b) An individual is not considered a resident for the purposes of this chapter if the individual:

17 (i) claims residence in another state or country for any purpose; or

18 (ii) is an absentee property owner paying property tax on property in Montana.

19 (38) "Seedling" means a marijuana plant that has no flowers and is less than 12 inches in height
20 and 12 inches in diameter.

21 (39) "State laboratory" means the laboratory operated by the department of public health and
22 human services to conduct environmental analyses.

23 (40) "Synthetic cannabinoids" has the meaning provided in 50-32-222 and includes any
24 cannabinoids produced artificially, whether from chemical synthesis or biosynthesis using recombinant
25 biological agents, including but not limited to yeast and algae.

26 (41) "Synthetic marijuana product" means marijuana or marijuana products that contain synthetic
27 cannabinoids.

28 ~~(40)~~(42) "Testing laboratory" means a qualified person, licensed under this chapter that:

- 1 (a) provides testing of representative samples of marijuana and marijuana products; and
- 2 (b) provides information regarding the chemical composition and potency of a sample, as well as
- 3 the presence of molds, pesticides, or other contaminants in a sample.

4 ~~(41)(43)~~ (a) "Usable marijuana" means the dried leaves and flowers of the marijuana plant that are
 5 appropriate for the use of marijuana by an individual.

6 (b) The term does not include the seeds, stalks, and roots of the plant. (Subsection (15)(b)(ii)
 7 terminates October 1, 2023--sec. 117(1), Ch. 576, L. 2021.)"

 9 **Section 6.** Section 16-12-108, MCA, is amended to read:

10 **"16-12-108. Limitations of act.** (1) This chapter does not permit:

- 11 (a) any individual to operate, navigate, or be in actual physical control of a motor vehicle, train,
 12 aircraft, motorboat, or other motorized form of transport while under the influence of marijuana or marijuana
 13 products;
- 14 (b) consumption of marijuana or marijuana products while operating or being in physical control of
 15 a motor vehicle, train, aircraft, motorboat, or other motorized form of transport while it is being operated;
- 16 (c) smoking or consuming marijuana while riding in the passenger seat within an enclosed
 17 compartment of a motor vehicle, train, aircraft, motorboat, or other motorized form of transport while it is being
 18 operated;
- 19 ~~(d)~~ production, delivery, distribution, purchase, or consumption of synthetic marijuana products;
- 20 ~~(d)(e)~~ delivery or distribution of marijuana or marijuana products, with or without consideration, to a
 21 person under 21 years of age;
- 22 ~~(e)(f)~~ purchase, consumption, or use of marijuana or marijuana products by a person under 21 years
 23 of age;
- 24 ~~(f)(g)~~ possession or transport of marijuana or marijuana products by a person under 21 years of age
 25 unless the underage person is at least 18 years of age and is an employee of a marijuana business licensed
 26 under this chapter and engaged in work activities;
- 27 ~~(g)(h)~~ possession or consumption of marijuana or marijuana products or possession of marijuana
 28 paraphernalia:

- 1 (i) on the grounds of any property owned or leased by a school district, a public or private
- 2 preschool, school, or postsecondary school as defined in 20-5-402;
- 3 (ii) in a school bus or other form of public transportation;
- 4 (iii) in a health care facility as defined in 50-5-101;
- 5 (iv) on the grounds of any correctional facility; or
- 6 (v) in a hotel or motel room;
- 7 ~~(h)(i)~~ using marijuana or marijuana products in a location where smoking tobacco is prohibited;
- 8 ~~(h)(j)~~ consumption of marijuana or marijuana products in a public place, except as allowed by the
- 9 department;
- 10 ~~(h)(k)~~ conduct that endangers others;
- 11 ~~(k)(l)~~ undertaking any task while under the influence of marijuana or marijuana products if doing so
- 12 would constitute negligence or professional malpractice; or
- 13 ~~(h)(m)~~ performing solvent-based extractions on marijuana using solvents other than water, glycerin,
- 14 propylene glycol, vegetable oil, or food-grade ethanol unless licensed for this activity by the department.
- 15 (2) A person may not cultivate marijuana in a manner that is visible from the street or other public
- 16 area.
- 17 (3) A hospice or residential care facility licensed under Title 50, chapter 5, may adopt a policy that
- 18 allows use of marijuana by a registered cardholder.

4 (5) Nothing in this chapter may be construed to prohibit a person from prohibiting or otherwise
5 regulating the consumption, cultivation, distribution, processing, sale, or display of marijuana, marijuana
6 products, and marijuana paraphernalia on private property the person owns, leases, occupies, or manages,
7 except that a lease agreement executed after January 1, 2021, may not prohibit a tenant from lawfully
8 possessing and consuming marijuana by means other than smoking unless required by federal law or to obtain
9 federal funding.

10 (6) A licensee who violates 15-64-103 or 15-64-104 or fails to pay any other taxes owed to the

12 aircraft, or other optical aids.

23 resistant exit packaging that complies with federal child resistance standards and is designed to be significantly
24 difficult for children under 5 years of age to open and not difficult for adults to use properly.

25 (b) (i) Packaging of individual products may contain only the following design elements and
26 language on a white label:

27 (A) the seller's business name and any accompanying logo or design mark;

28 (B) the name of the product; and

1 (C) the THC content or CBD content, health warning messages as provided in 16-12-215, and
2 ingredients.

3 (ii) All packaging and outward labeling, including business logos and design marks, must also
4 comply with any standards or criteria established by the department, including but not limited to allowable
5 symbols and imagery.

6 (7) An adult-use dispensary or medical marijuana dispensary may not sell or otherwise transfer
7 hemp flower, hemp plants, synthetic cannabinoids, tobacco, alternative nicotine products, or alcohol from a
8 licensed premises.

9 (8) (a) Prior to selling, offering for sale, or transferring marijuana or marijuana product that is for
10 ultimate sale to a consumer or registered cardholder, a licensee or license applicant shall submit both a
11 package and a label application, in a form prescribed by the department, to receive approval from the
12 department.

13 (b) The initial submission must be made electronically if required by the department. The licensee
14 or license applicant shall submit a physical prototype upon request by the department.

15 (c) If a license applicant submits packages and labels for preapproval, final determination for
16 packages and labels may not be made until the applicant has been issued a license.

17 (d) A packaging and label application must include:

18 (i) a fee provided for in rule by the department;

19 (ii) documentation that all exit packaging has been certified as child-resistant by a federally
20 qualified third-party child-resistant package testing firm;

21 (iii) a picture or rendering of and description of the item to be placed in each package; and

22 (iv) for label applications for inhalable marijuana products that contain nonmarijuana additives:

23 (A) the nonmarijuana additive's list of ingredients; and

24 (B) in a form and manner prescribed by the department, information regarding the additive or
25 additives and the manufacturer of the additive or additives.

26 (9) For the purpose of this section, "exit packaging" means a sealed, child-resistant certified
27 receptacle into which marijuana or marijuana products already within a container are placed at the retail point of
28 sale."

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Section 9. Section 45-5-623, MCA, is amended to read:

"45-5-623. Unlawful transactions with children. (1) Except as provided for in 16-6-305, a person

commits the offense of unlawful transactions with children if the person knowingly:

- (a) sells or gives explosives to a child except as authorized under appropriate city ordinances;
- (b) sells or gives intoxicating substances other than alcoholic beverages to a child;
- (c) sells or gives an alcoholic beverage to a person under 21 years of age;
- (d) sells or gives to a child a tobacco product, alternative nicotine product, or vapor product, as

defined in 16-11-302;

(e) sells or gives to a child a synthetic marijuana product, as defined in 16-12-102;

~~(e)(f)~~ being a junk dealer, pawnbroker, or secondhand dealer, receives or purchases goods from a child without authorization of the parent or guardian; or

~~(f)(g)~~ tattoos or provides a body piercing on a child without the explicit in-person consent of the child's parent or guardian. For purposes of this subsection (1)~~(f)(g)~~, "tattoo" and "body piercing" have the meaning provided in 50-48-102. Failure to adequately verify the identity of a parent or guardian is not an excuse for violation of this subsection (1)~~(f)(g)~~.

(2) A person convicted of the offense of unlawful transactions with children shall be fined an amount not to exceed \$500 or be imprisoned in the county jail for any term not to exceed 6 months, or both. A person convicted of a second offense of unlawful transactions with children shall be fined an amount not to exceed \$1,000 or be imprisoned in the county jail for any term not to exceed 6 months, or both. (See compiler's comments for contingent termination of certain text.)"

- 26 atom in a cyclic structure; and
- 27 (iv) any lengthening of the propanone chain between carbons 1 and 2 to any extent with alkyl
- 28 groups, whether further substituted or not;

1 (nn) any compound not listed in this code, in an administrative rule regulating controlled substances
2 or approved for use by the United States food and drug administration that is structurally derived from 2-amino-
3 1-phenyl-1-propane by modification in any of the following ways:

4 (i) by substitution in the phenyl ring to any extent with alkyl, alkoxy, alkylendioxy, haloalkyl, or
5 halide substituents, whether or not further substituted in the phenyl ring by one or more other univalent
6 substituents;

7 (ii) by substitution at the 3-position with an alkyl substituent;

8 (iii) by substitution at the nitrogen atom with alkyl or dialkyl groups, or by inclusion of the nitrogen
9 atom in a cyclic structure; and

10 (iv) any lengthening of the propane chain between carbons 1 and 2 to any extent with alkyl groups,
11 whether further substituted or not.

12 (5) (a) For the purposes of subsection (4), the term "isomer" includes the optical, positional, and
13 geometric isomers.

14 (b) Subsection (4)(kk) does not apply to synthetic cannabinoids approved by the United States
15 food and drug administration and obtained by a lawful prescription through a licensed pharmacy. The
16 department of public health and human services shall adopt a rule listing the approved cannabinoids and shall
17 update the rule as necessary to keep the list current.

18 (6) Depressants. Unless specifically excepted or listed in another schedule, any material,
19 compound, mixture, or preparation that contains any quantity of the following substances is a depressant
20 having a depressant effect on the central nervous system, including salts, isomers, and salts of isomers
21 whenever the existence of those salts, isomers, and salts of isomers is possible within the specific chemical
22 designation:

23 (a) gamma-hydroxybutyric acid, also known as gamma-hydroxybutyrate, 4-hydroxybutyrate, 4-
24 hydroxybutanoic acid, sodium oxybate, sodium oxybutyrate, and GHB;

25 (b) mecloqualone; and

26 (c) methaqualone.

27 (7) Stimulants. Unless specifically excepted or listed in another schedule, any material, compound,
28 mixture, or preparation that contains any quantity of the following substances is a stimulant having a stimulant

1 effect on the central nervous system, including its salts, isomers, and salts of isomers:

2 (a) aminorex, also known as aminoxaphen, 2-amino-5-phenyl-2-oxazoline, and 4,5-dihydro-5-
3 phenyl-2-oxazolamine;

4 (b) cathinone, also known as 2-amino-1-phenyl-1-propanone, alpha-aminopropiophenone, 2-
5 aminopropiophenone, and norephedrone;

6 (c) fenethylamine;

7 (d) methcathinone, also known as 2-(methylamino)-propionophenone, alpha-
8 (methylamino)propionophenone, 2-(methylamino)-1-phenylpropan-1-one, alpha-N-methylaminopropiophenone,
9 monomethylpropion, ephedrone, N-methylcathinone, methylcathinone, AL-464, AL-422, AL-463, and UR1432,
10 including its salts, optical isomers, and salts of optical isomers;

11 (e) 4-Methylaminorex (cis isomer), also known as U4Euh, McN-422;

12 (f) (levo-dextro) cis-4-methylaminorex, also known as (levo-dextro) cis-4, 5-dihydro-4-methyl-5-
13 phenyl-2-oxazolamine;

14 (g) N-benzylpiperazine, also known as 1-benzylpiperazine or BZP;

15 (h) N-ethylamphetamine; and

16 (i) NN, -dimethylamphetamine, also known as NN, -alpha-trimethyl-benzeneethanamine and NN, -
17 alpha-trimethylphenethylamine.

18 (8) Substances subject to emergency scheduling. Any material, compound, mixture, or preparation
19 that contains any quantity of the following substances is included in this category:

20 (a) N-[1-benzyl-4-piperidyl]-N-phenylpropanamide (benzylfentanyl), its optical isomers, salts, and
21 salts of isomers); and

22 (b) N-[1-(2-thienyl)methyl-4-piperidyl]-N-phenylpropanamide (thenylfentanyl), its optical isomers,
23 salts, and salts of isomers).

24 (9) If prescription or administration is authorized by the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act, then
25 any material, compound, mixture, or preparation containing tetrahydrocannabinols listed in subsection (4) must
26 automatically be rescheduled from Schedule I to the same schedule it is placed in by the United States drug
27 enforcement administration.

28 (10) Dangerous drug analogues. Unless specifically excepted or listed in another schedule, this

1 designation includes any material, compound, mixture, or preparation defined in 50-32-101 as a dangerous
2 drug analogue."

3

4 **Section 12.** Section 80-18-101, MCA, is amended to read:

5 **"80-18-101. Definitions.** As used in this part, the following definitions apply:

6 (1) (a) "Hemp" means all parts and varieties of the plant Cannabis consistent with the United
7 States department of agriculture's definition of hemp and rules established by the department the plant species
8 Cannabis sativa L. and any part of that plant, including the seeds and all derivatives, extracts, cannabinoids,
9 isomers, acids, salts, and salts of isomers, whether growing or not, with a total delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol
10 concentration of not more than 0.3% on a dry weight basis.

11 (b) The term does not include synthetic cannabinoids.

12 (2) "Hemp crude" means a hemp derivative in a temporary state of not complying with the legal
13 definition of hemp, the amount of tetrahydrocannabinol, or the amount of tetrahydrocannabinolic acid that will
14 be further processed in order to comply.

15 (3) "Hemp derivatives" means all products that contain or are processed from, extracted from, or
16 manufactured from hemp.

17 (4) "Marijuana" means all plant material from the genus Cannabis containing tetrahydrocannabinol
18 (THC) or seeds of the genus capable of germination.

19 (5) "Synthetic cannabinoids" has the meaning provided in 50-32-222 and includes any
20 cannabinoids produced artificially, whether from chemical synthesis or biosynthesis using recombinant
21 biological agents, including but not limited to yeast and algae."

22

23 NEW SECTION. **Section 13. Appropriation.** There is appropriated \$2,500 from the state special
24 revenue fund in 16-12-111 to the department of revenue for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, for the
25 purposes of administration of the advisory council provided for in [section 3] and additional reporting
26 requirement provisions as required under 16-12-125.

27

28 NEW SECTION. **Section 14. Codification instruction.** (1) [Section 1] is intended to be codified as

1 an integral part of Title 16, chapter 12, part 1, and the provisions of Title 16, chapter 12, part 1, apply to [section
2 1].

3 (2) [Section 2] is intended to be codified as an integral part of Title 16, chapter 12, part 3, and the
4 provisions of Title 16, chapter 12, part 3, apply to [section 2].

5
6 NEW SECTION. Section 15. Severability. If a part of [this act] is invalid, all valid parts that are
7 severable from the invalid part remain in effect. If a part of [this act] is invalid in one or more of its applications,
8 the part remains in effect in all valid applications that are severable from the invalid applications.

9
10 NEW SECTION. Section 16. Effective date. [This act] is effective on passage and approval.

12 NEW SECTION. Section 17. Termination. [Section 3] terminates December 31, 2024.
