12	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
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14	NEW SECTION. Section 1. Legislative findings purpose. (1) The legislature finds that:
15	(a) the utilization of education and workforce data holds great promise for developing the full
16	educational potential of Montanans and in maximizing the effectiveness of state investments in education and
17	workforce systems; and
18	(b) a systems approach with shared governance between relevant agencies is the best way to
19	utilize education and workforce data while ensuring that the data is only used for appropriate purposes and in
20	compliance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, 20 U.S.C. 1232g, as amended, and its
21	implementing regulations at 34 CFR, part 99, and all other relevant federal and state privacy laws, and any
22	other privacy measures required by the education and workforce data governing board.
23	(2) The purpose of [sections 1 through 3] is to create a strong and transparent education and
24	workforce data governing board with authority over the linkage of education and workforce data gathered and
25	maintained by state agencies to ensure that the data is used to benefit the people of the state in a secure
26	manner and only for appropriate purposes.
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28	NEW SECTION. Section 2. Definitions. As used in this part, the following definitions apply:

22	(4)	"Workforce data" means data related to an individual's workforce outcomes, including but not
23	limited to, an individual's:	
24	(a)	labor and workforce training program participation and completion information data;
25	(b)	wage information;
26	(c)	unemployment claim eligibility information;
27	(d)	employer information; and
28	(e)	demographics data.



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2	NEW	SECTION. Section 3. Education and workforce data governing board membership	
3	duties. (1) Th	ere is an education and workforce data governing board. The board is administratively attached	
4	to the department of administration as provided in 2-15-121.		
5	(2)	The board is comprised of five voting members:	
6	(a)	the director of the department of administration or the director's designee;	
7	(b)	the superintendent of public instruction or the superintendent's designee;	
8	(c) the commissioner of higher education or the commissioner's designee;		
9	(d)	the commissioner of labor and industry or the commissioner's designee; and	
10	(e)	the presiding officer of the board of public education or the presiding officer's designee.	
11	(3)	The nonvoting members of the board include the following are:	
12	(a)	the state chief information officer or the officer's designee;	
13	(b)	the legislative fiscal analyst or the analyst's designee;	
14	(c)	the legislative auditor or the auditor's designee; and	
15	(d)	the director of legislative services or the director's designee.	
16	(4)	The presiding officer of the board is the director of the department of administration or the	
17	director's designee.		
18	(5)	The board shall meet at least quarterly. The presiding officer may call special meetings	
19	whenever necessary. The presiding officer shall notify each member of the board of any special meeting before		
20	the fixed time for the special meeting. A majority of the board may petition the presiding officer to call a special		
21	meeting.		
22	(6)	Meetings of the board must be open to the public. Archived videos of the board's meetings	
23	must be made available to the public through the website.

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7 - availability for timely use to improve instruction. (1) The office of public instruction's-instruction shall

"20-7-104. Transparency and public availability of public school performance data -- reporting -

8 <u>establish, maintain, and continually improve a statewide K-12</u> data system must that, at a minimum:

9 include includes data entry and intuitive reporting options that school districts can use to make (a) 10 timely decisions that improve instruction and impact student performance while creating a collaborative 11 environment for parents, teachers, and students to work together in improving student performance. Options 12 that the office of public instruction shall incorporate and make available for each school district must include 13 data linkages to provide for automated conversion of data from systems already in use by school districts or by 14 the office of public instruction that allow districts to collect, manage, and present local classroom assessment 15 scores, grades, attendance, and other data to assist in instructional intervention alongside the existing school 16 accountability and statewide student achievement results. The office of public instruction shall ensure that the 17 design of the system is enhanced to prioritize collaborative support of each student's needs by classroom 18 educators, administrators, and parents.

(c) facilitates matching of student-level K-12 data with higher education and workforce data; and
(b)(d) display a publicly available educational data profile for each school district that protects each

2 (4) (a) Each school district shall also post on the school district's internet website a copy of every 3 working agreement the district has with any organized labor organization and the district's costs, if any, 4 associated with employee union representation, collective bargaining, and union grievance procedures and 5 litigation resulting from union employee grievances. 6 (5)(b) If a school district does not have an internet website, the school district shall publish the 7 information required under subsections (2) and (3) subsection (4)(a) in printed form and provide a copy of the 8 information upon request at the cost incurred by the school district for printing only. 9 (6)(5) The superintendent of public instruction shall continually work in consultation with the K-12 10 data task force provided for in 20-7-105 to analyze the best options for a statewide K-12 data system that will 11 best enhance the ability of school districts to use data for the purposes identified in this section meeting the 12 requirements of subsection (1). Emphasis must be placed on developing or purchasing and customizing a 13 statewide data system that promotes and preserves community ownership and local control and that 14 incorporates innovative technologies available in the marketplace that may be in use and that are successfully 15 working in other states. The office of public instruction and the K-12 data task force shall collaborate to enhance 16 the statewide data system to support: 17 (a) the needs of school districts in using data to improve instruction and student performance; 18 (b) the collection of data from schools through a process that provides for automated conversion of 19 data from systems already in use by school districts or the office of public instruction and that resolves the 20 repetition of data entry and redundancy of data requested that has been characteristic of the data system in the past and that otherwise reduces the diversion of district staff time away from instruction and supervision; 21 22 (c) increased use of data from the centralized system by various functions within the office of public 23 instruction; and 24 (d) transparency in reporting to schools, school districts, communities, and the public. 25 (7)(6) The In addition to the school district profiles under subsection (2), the superintendent of public instruction shall gather, maintain, and distribute and make available on the office of public instruction's website 26 27 longitudinal, actionable data in at least the following areas: 28 (a) statewide student identifier demographic information;

2	K-12 education system meets the expectations of the Montana university system and the workforce needs of
3	the state. The superintendent shall determine the necessity of research requests from the commissioner and
4	the department of labor and industry and may only release student-level information after entering agreements
5	with the commissioner and the department to ensure student privacy. An agreement under this subsection
6	(9)(b) must:
7	(i) expire no later than 18 months after the agreement is made; and
8	(ii) require the commissioner and the department to destroy and retain no part of student-level
9	information upon completion of the research outlined in the agreement.
10	(c) If the superintendent of public instruction offers a statewide assessment that also serves as a
11	college entrance exam, a student's personally identifiable information may be released with the consent of the
12	student to accredited postsecondary education institutions, testing agencies under contract with a state entity to
13	provide a college entrance exam to students, or scholarship organizations. A scholarship organization may use
14	information released under this subsection (9)(c) only for the purpose of scholarship opportunities. The
15	legislature intends that the release of information pursuant to this subsection (9)(c) is for the sole purpose of
16	increasing access to higher education opportunities for students.
17	(10) On or before June 30, 2013, the superintendent of public instruction shall begin presenting
18	longitudinal data on academic achievement and shall develop plans for a measurement of growth for the
19	statewide student assessment required by the board of public education.
20	(7) In accordance with [sections 1 through 3] and except as otherwise provided and explicitly
21	directed in state law, the superintendent of public instruction may not share or restrict the sharing of student
22	educational records beyond what is allowed or restricted under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act
23	of 1974, 20 U.S.C. 1232g, as amended, and its implementing regulations at 34 CFR, part 99."

25	NEW SECTION. Section 5. Appropriation. (1) There is appropriated \$100,000 from the general fund
26	to the department of administration for each year of the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, for the purposes of
27	[sections 1 through 3].
28	(2) The legislature intends that the appropriation in this section be considered part of the ongoing



1 base for the next legislative session.

3 NEW SECTION. Section 6. Transition. Data sharing agreements between the office of public 4 instruction, the department of labor and industry, and the commissioner of higher education made under the 5 authority of 20-7-104(9) prior to [the effective date of this act] remain in effect until the earlier of the expiration 6 date of the agreement or the adoption by the education and workforce data governing board of policies governing the linkage and sharing of education and workforce data relevant to the agreement. The legislature 7 intends that the policies of the education and workforce data governing board replace the need for ad hoc data 8 9 sharing agreements to the greatest extent possible. 10 11 NEW SECTION. Section 7. Codification instruction. [Sections 1 through 3] are intended to be 12 codified as an integral part of Title 20, chapter 7, part 1, and the provisions of Title 20, chapter 7, part 1, apply 13 to [sections 1 through 3]. 14 NEW SECTION.
