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19	Section 1. Section 7-6-1601, MCA, is amended to read:
20	"7-6-1601. Definitions. As used in this part, the following definitions apply:
21	(1) (a) "Capital improvements" means improvements, land, and equipment with a useful life of 10
22	years or more that increase or improve the service capacity of a public facility.
23	(b) The term does not include consumable supplies.
24	(2) "Connection charge" means the actual cost of connecting a property to a public utility system
25	and is limited to the labor, materials, and overhead involved in making connections and installing meters.
26	(3) "Department" means the department of commerce provided for in 2-15-1801.
27	(3)(4) "Development" means construction, renovation, or installation of a building or structure, a

2	other action creates additional demand for public facilities.
3	(4)(5) "Governmental entity" means a county, city, town, or consolidated government.
4	(5)(6) (a) "Impact fee" means any charge imposed upon development by a governmental entity as
5	part of the development approval process to fund the additional service capacity required by the development
6	from which it is collected. An impact fee may include a fee for the administration of the impact fee not to exceed
7	5% of the total impact fee collected.
8	(b) The term does not include:
9	(i) a charge or fee to pay for administration, plan review, or inspection costs associated with a
10	permit required for development;
11	(ii) a connection charge;
12	(iii) any other fee authorized by law, including but not limited to user fees, special improvement
13	district assessments, fees authorized under Title 7 for county, municipal, and consolidated government sewer
14	and water districts and systems, and costs of ongoing maintenance; or
15	(iv) onsite or offsite improvements necessary for new development to meet the safety, level of
16	service, and other minimum development standards that have been adopted by the governmental entity.
17	(c) Within 60 days of the collection of an impact fee, the governmental entity shall remit 20% of the
18	administration fee provided in subsection (6)(a), if collected, to the department for administrative purposes.
19	(7) "Independent firm" means an engineering firm or other professional firm with appropriate
20	qualifications determined and approved by the department to prepare service area reports as required in 7-6-
21	1602 and reports as required in subsection (10)(f) of this section;
22	(8) "Long-term transportation plan" means a plan that:
23	(a) identifies unique transportation service areas and details the needs of each service area;
24	(b) identifies the public facility project or projects within each service area for which impact fees are
25	sought to be imposed;
26	(c) is applicable for at least 20 years from the date of adoption; and
27	(d) is updated at least every 5 years.

1	(6)(9) "Proportionate share" means that portion of the cost of capital system improvements that
2	reasonably relates to the service demands and needs of the project. A proportionate share must take into
3	account the limitations provided in 7-6-1602.
4	(7)(10) "Public facilities" means:
5	(a) a water supply production, treatment, storage, or distribution facility;
6	(b) a wastewater collection, treatment, or disposal facility;
7	(c) a transportation facility, including roads, streets, bridges, rights-of-way, traffic signals, and
8	landscaping only if the governmental entity has adopted a long-term transportation plan that requires all impact
9	fees used for transportation facilities to be consistent with the long-term transportation plan;
10	(d) a storm water collection, retention, detention, treatment, or disposal facility or a flood control
11	facility;
12	(e) a police, emergency medical rescue, or fire protection facility; and
13	(f) other facilities approved by the department by application:
14	(i) providing documentation as required in 7-6-1602; and
15	(ii) including a report from a qualified, independent firm approved by the department that identifies
16	and documents with specificity the connection between the public facility project or projects for which the impact
17	fees are sought and the benefits to the properties on which the impact fee is sought to be imposed
18	for which documentation is prepared as provided in 7-6-1602 that have been approved as part of an
19	impact fee ordinance or resolution by:
20	(i) a two-thirds majority of the governing body of an incorporated city, town, or consolidated local
21	government; or
22	(ii) a unanimous vote of the board of county commissioners of a county government."

24	Section 2. Section 7-6-1602, MCA, is amended to read:
25	"7-6-1602. Calculation of impact fees documentation required ordinance or resolution
26	requirements for impact fees. (1) (a) For each public facility for which an impact fee is imposed, the
27	governmental entity shall prepare and approve a service area report.

2	(i) prepared, along with any amendments to the service area report, by an independent firm paid

4	(ii) updated at minimum every 5 years with updates prepared by an independent firm paid for by

7	entity's website, if the governmental entity has an active website, no later than 30 days after the service area
8	plan is approved, updated, or amended.
9	(2) The service area report is a written analysis that must:
10	(a) describe existing conditions of the facility;
11	(b) establish level-of-service standards;
12	(c) forecast future additional needs for service for a defined period of time;
13	(d) identify capital improvements necessary to meet future needs for service;
14	(e) identify those capital improvements needed for continued operation and maintenance of the
15	facility;
16	(f) make a determination as to whether one service area or more than one service area is
17	necessary to establish a correlation between impact fees and benefits;
18	(g) make a determination as to whether one service area or more than one service area for
19	transportation facilities is needed to establish a correlation between impact fees and benefits;
20	(h) establish the methodology and time period over which the governmental entity will assign the
21	proportionate share of capital costs for expansion of the facility to provide service to new development within
22	each service area;
23	(i) establish the methodology that the governmental entity will use to exclude operations and
24	maintenance costs and correction of existing deficiencies from the impact fee;
25	(j) establish the amount of the impact fee that will be imposed for each unit of increased service
26	demand; and
27	(k) have a component of the budget of the governmental entity that:

1	(i) schedules construction of public facility capital improvements to serve projected growth;
2	(ii) projects costs of the capital improvements;
3	(iii) allocates collected impact fees for construction of the capital improvements; and
4	(iv) covers at least a 5-year period and is reviewed and updated at least every 5 years.
5	(3) The service area report is a written analysis that must:
6	(a) be consistent with the capital improvement plan;
7	(b) contain documentation of sources and methodology used for purposes of subsection (2); and
8	(c) must document how each impact fee meets the requirements of subsection (7) (8).
9	(4) The service area report may only include public facility projects:
10	(a) identified in a capital improvement plan adopted by the governing body of the governmental
11	entity;
12	(b) with a start date not more than 3 years from the date the service area plan is approved and a
13	defined completion date not more than 5 years after the date the service area plan is approved; and
14	(c) accompanied by an independent engineering study that identifies the costs and benefits of the
15	project, if the public facility project costs more than \$1 million, paid for and approved by the governmental
16	entity.
17	(4)(5) The service area report that supports adoption and calculation of an impact fee must be
18	available to the public upon request.
19	(5)(6) The amount of each impact fee imposed must be based upon the actual cost of public facility
20	expansion or improvements or reasonable estimates of the cost to be incurred by the governmental entity as a
21	result of new development. The calculation of each impact fee must be in accordance with generally accepted
22	accounting principles.
23	(6)(7) The ordinance or resolution adopting the impact fee must include a time schedule for
24	periodically updating the documentation required under subsection (2).
25	(7)(8) An impact fee must meet the following requirements:
26	(a) The amount of the impact fee must be reasonably related to and reasonably attributable to the
27	development's share of the cost of infrastructure improvements made necessary by the new development.

1	(b) The impact fees imposed may not exceed a proportionate share of the costs incurred or to be
2	incurred by the governmental entity in accommodating the development. The following factors must be
3	considered in determining a proportionate share of public facilities capital improvements costs:
4	(i) the need for public facilities capital improvements required to serve new development; and
5	(ii) consideration of payments for system improvements reasonably anticipated to be made by or
6	as a result of the development in the form of user fees, debt service payments, taxes, and other available
7	sources of funding the system improvements.
8	(c) Costs for correction of existing deficiencies in a public facility may not be included in the impact
9	fee.
10	(d) New development may not be held to a higher level of service than existing users unless there
11	is a mechanism in place for the existing users to make improvements to the existing system to match the higher
12	level of service.
13	(e) Impact fees may not include expenses for operations and maintenance of the facility."

15	Section 1. Section 7-6-1603, MCA, is amended to read:
16	"7-6-1603. Collection and expenditure of impact fees refunds or credits mechanism for
17	appeal required CAUSE OF ACTION. (1) The collection and expenditure of impact fees must comply with this
18	part. The collection and expenditure of impact fees must be reasonably related to the benefits accruing to the
19	development paying the impact fees. The ordinance or resolution adopted by the governmental entity must
20	include the following requirements:
21	(a) Upon collection, impact fees Impact fees collected for a public facility project must be deposited
22	in a special proprietary fund, which must be invested with all interest accruing to the fund created specifically for
23	each public facility with individual projects accounted for within each fund AS IDENTIFIED IN THE SERVICE AREA
24	REPORT. Funds must be invested with all interest accruing to the fund. Impact fees collected for a specific public
25	facility may not be transferred to a different account FUND and must be spent and accounted for solely for the
26	projects in the public facility as identified in the service area report.
27	(b) A governmental entity may impose impact fees on behalf of local districts.

(c) (i) If the impact fees are not collected or spent in accordance with the impact fee ordinance or resolution or in accordance with 7-6-1602, any impact fees that were collected must be refunded within 90 days of the determination that the impact fees were not collected or spent correctly as provided in this part to the person who owned the property at the time that the refund was due the impact fee in question was paid.

- (II) IF A WRITTEN REQUEST IS SUBMITTED AS PROVIDED FOR IN SUBSECTION (9), THE GOVERNMENTAL ENTITY SHALL REFUND ANY IMPACT FEE DUE UNDER SUBSECTION (1)(C)(I) WITHIN 90 DAYS.
- 7 (III) The governmental entity may not impose conditions when issuing a refund pursuant to this 8 part.
 - (d) Impact fees may only be used to acquire, construct, or improve the specific public facility project for which they were collected and may only be expended in compliance with the relevant capital improvement plan and service area report.
 - (2) All impact fees imposed pursuant to the authority granted in this part must be paid no earlier than the date of issuance of a building permit if a building permit is required for the development or no earlier than the time of wastewater or water service connection or well or septic permitting.
 - (3) A governmental entity may recoup costs of excess capacity in existing capital facilities, when the excess capacity has been provided in anticipation of the needs of new development, by requiring impact fees for that portion of the facilities constructed for future users. The need to recoup costs for excess capacity must have been documented pursuant to 7-6-1602 in a manner that demonstrates the need for the excess capacity. This part does not prevent a governmental entity from continuing to assess an impact fee that recoups costs for excess capacity in an existing facility. The impact fees imposed to recoup the costs to provide the excess capacity must be based on the governmental entity's actual cost of acquiring, constructing, or upgrading the facility and must be no more than a proportionate share of the costs to provide the excess capacity.
 - (4) Governmental entities may accept the dedication of land or the construction of public facilities in lieu of payment of impact fees if:
 - (a) the need for the dedication or construction is clearly documented pursuant to 7-6-1602;

(c) formulas or procedures for determining the worth of proposed dedications or constructions are established as part of the impact fee ordinance or resolution; and

- (d) a means to establish credits against future impact fee revenue has been created as part of the adopting ordinance or resolution if the dedication of land or construction of public facilities is of worth in excess of the impact fee due from an individual development.
- (5) Impact fees may not be imposed for remodeling, rehabilitation, or other improvements to an existing structure or for rebuilding a damaged structure unless there is an increase in units that increase service demand as described in 7-6-1602(2)(j). If impact fees are imposed for remodeling, rehabilitation, or other improvements to an existing structure or use, only the net increase between the old and new demand may be imposed.
- (6) This part does not prevent a governmental entity from granting refunds or credits:
- 12 (a) that it considers appropriate and that are consistent with the provisions of 7-6-1602 and this
 13 chapter; or
 - (b) in accordance with a voluntary agreement, consistent with the provisions of 7-6-1602 and this chapter, between the governmental entity and the individual or entity being assessed the impact fees.
 - (7) An impact fee represents a fee for service payable by all users creating additional demand on the facility.
 - (8) An impact fee ordinance or resolution must include a mechanism whereby a person charged an impact fee may appeal the charge if the person believes an error has been made.
 - (9) If a public facility project is abandoned by a governmental entity, the governmental entity shall refund the total amount of impact fees collected for the abandoned project. If the actual cost of a public facility project is 80% or less of the total cost of the project estimated in the service area report, a portion of the impact fees that is proportionate to the cost difference must be refunded. Refunds allowed under this subsection must occur within 90 days after the governmental entity abandons the public facility project or determines the public facility project overfunded.
 - (10) All refunds allowed under this section must be paid to the person who paid the impact fee for the public facility project in question. If the person who paid the impact fee cannot be located within 12 months
