7	PROVIDING FOR PARENT INVOLVEMENT IN EDUCATION; PROVIDING THAT PARENTS MAY			
8	WITHDRAW THEIR CHILD FROM HARMFUL SCHOOL INSTRUCTION; PROVIDING THAT PARENTS

20	NEW SECTION. Section 1. Parental involvement in education. (1) The board of trustees of a			
21	school district, in consultation with parents, teachers, and administrators, shall develop and adopt a policy to			
22	promote the involvement of parents of children enrolled in the school district, including:			
23	(a) a plan for parent participation in the school district, which must be designed to improve parent			
24	and teacher cooperation in homework, attendance, and discipline;			
25	(b) procedures by which a parent may learn about the course of study for the parent's child and			
26	review all curriculum;			
27	(c) procedures by which a parent may object to any specific instruction or presentation on the			
28	basis that it is harmful and may withdraw the parent's child from the instruction or presentation. For the

18	phone, laptop, or tablet, or other written or electronic materials that have been or will be assigned, distributed,			
19	or otherwise pr	resented physically or virtually to students in a class or course.

21	NEW S	SECTION. Section 2. Construction. (1) Unless parental rights have been legally waived or		
22	legally termina	ted, parents have inalienable rights that are more comprehensive than those described in 40-6-		
23	701 or [section	1]. The protections afforded by 40-6-701 and [section 1] are in addition to the protections		
24	provided under	federal law, other state laws, the United States constitution, and the Montana constitution.		
25	(2)	Section 40-6-701 and [section 1] must be construed in favor of a broad protection of the		
26	fundamental riç	ght of parents to direct the upbringing, education, health care, and mental health of their child.

- 5 All fundamental parental rights are exclusively reserved to the parent of a child without (2) 6 obstruction or interference by a governmental entity, including but not limited to the rights and responsibilities to 7 do the following: 8 direct the education of the child, including the right to choose public, private, religious, or home (a) 9 schools and the right to make reasonable choices within public schools for the education of the child; access and review all written and electronic educational records relating to the child that are 10 (b) 11 controlled by or in the possession of a school; direct the upbringing of the child; 12 (c) <u>(d</u>) direct the moral or religious training of the child; 13 make and consent in writing to all physical and mental health care decisions for the child, 14 (e) 15 except that emergency medical services may be provided to a child if necessary to prevent death or imminent, 16 irreparable physical injury or if, after a reasonably diligent effort, the parent cannot be contacted; 17 access and review all health and medical records of the child; (f) 18 consent in writing before a biometric scan of the child is made, shared, or stored; <u>(g)</u> consent in writing before any record of the child's blood or DNA is created, stored, or shared, 19 (h) 20 unless authorized pursuant to a court order; consent in writing before a governmental entity makes an audio or video recording of the child, 21 (i) 22 unless the audio or video recording is made during or as part of: 23 (i) a court proceeding; 24 (ii) a law enforcement investigation; 25 (iii) a forensic interview in a criminal or child abuse and neglect investigation; the security or surveillance of buildings or grounds; or 26 (iv) (v) 27 a photo identification card;

3	(k) opt the child out of any personal analysis, evaluation, survey, or data collected by a school
4	district that would capture data for inclusion in the state longitudinal student data system, except what is
5	necessary and essential for establishing a student's educational record;
6	(I) have the child excused from school attendance for religious purposes; and
7	(m) participate in parent-teacher associations and school organizations that are sanctioned by the
8	board of trustees of a school district.
9	(3) Except for law enforcement, an employee of a governmental entity may not encourage or
10	coerce a child to withhold information from the child's parent and may not withhold from a child's parent
11	information that is relevant to the physical, emotional, or mental health of the child.
12	(2)(4) This section may not be construed as invalidating the provisions of Title 41, chapter 3, or
13	modifying the burden of proof at any stage of the proceedings under Title 41, chapter 3.
14	(3)(5) When a parent's fundamental rights protected by this section and [section 1] are violated, a
15	parent may assert that violation as a claim or defense in a <u>an</u> <u>administrative</u> or judicial proceeding and may
16	obtain appropriate relief against the governmental entity without regard to whether the proceeding is brought by
17	or in the name of the governmental entity, a private person, or any other party. The prevailing party in an action
18	filed pursuant to this section is entitled to reasonable attorney fees and costs.
19	(4)(6) The superintendent of public instruction has the authority to receive a complaint involving a
20	violation of [section 1] and this section and shall take action to enforce compliance with [section 1] and this
21	section.
22	(7) As used in this section, the following definitions apply:
23	(a) "Educational record" means attendance records, test scores of school-administered tests and
24	statewide assessments, grades, extracurricular activity or club participation, e-mail accounts, online or virtual
25	accounts or data, disciplinary records, counseling records, psychological records, applications for admission,
26	teacher and counselor evaluations, reports of behavioral patterns, and health and immunization information,
27	including any medical records maintained by a health clinic or medical facility operated or controlled by the
28	school district or located on district property.
