1 SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9 2 INTRODUCED BY B. GILLESPIE, J. ELLIS 3 A JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF 4 5 MONTANA ESTABLISHING THE FIRST WEEK IN APRIL AS MONTANA SOIL HEALTH WEEK AND THE 6 FIRST WEDNESDAY IN APRIL AS SOIL HEALTH DAY. 7 8 WHEREAS, recognizing soil as an essential natural resource, and Montana's agricultural producers 9 and professionals as playing a critical role in managing Montana's soil and water resources; and 10 WHEREAS, Montana is home to more than 27,000 agricultural producers who are reporting less farm-11 related income; and WHEREAS, the Natural Resources Conservation Service of the United States Department of 12 Agriculture defines soil health as the continued capacity of soil to function as a vital living ecosystem that 13 14 sustains plants, animals, and humans; and WHEREAS, the concept of soil health across the Montana landscape is not new, but is only recently 15 16 recognized as needed to prevent soil degradation and the degradation of soil can be rapid, while the formation and regeneration processes can be very slow; and 17 18 WHEREAS, as of 2007, an average of 6.4 tons of topsoil per acre were lost every year due to erosion 19 in Montana, compromising the productivity of agriculture in the state; and 20 WHEREAS, agriculture is Montana's top industry, generating more than \$3.7 billion in services and 21 products to the state's economy; and WHEREAS, Montana's fish, wildlife, and diverse ecosystem generate almost \$4 billion a year to 22 23 Montana's economy and provide one ninth of the total jobs that are dependent on soil health; and 24 WHEREAS, healthy soil increases nutrient availability and helps capture, retain, and store more water, 25 increasing the economic viability of farms and ranches, the availability of water for municipalities and 26 recreational uses, and in-stream flows for power generation; and 27 WHEREAS, as soil organic carbon increases, so does its water holding capacity, increasing 28 agriculture's resilience to drought and water shortages; and
