

## 1 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

2 INTRODUCED BY L. SHELDON-GALLOWAY

3 BY REQUEST OF THE STATE-TRIBAL RELATIONS COMMITTEE

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5 A JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF  
6 MONTANA REQUESTING AN INTERIM STUDY OF MISSING YOUTH; AND REQUIRING THAT THE FINAL  
7 RESULTS OF THE STUDY BE REPORTED TO THE 69TH LEGISLATURE.  
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9 WHEREAS, 80% of all missing persons in Montana are youth under 18 years of age.  
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11 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF  
12 THE STATE OF MONTANA:

13 That the Legislative Council be requested to designate an appropriate interim committee or statutory  
14 committee, pursuant to section 5-5-217, MCA, or direct sufficient staff resources to examine the issue of  
15 missing youth for the purpose of determining how the State of Montana can reduce the number of missing  
16 youth and increase the chances of quickly locating missing youth.

17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the interim committee:

18 (1) collaborate with the Department of Justice and the missing persons specialist, youth courts and  
19 juvenile probation officers, the Office of Public Instruction, the Department of Public Health and Human  
20 Services, the Missing Indigenous Persons Task Force, the Missing Indigenous Persons Review Commission,  
21 tribal governments, and youth organizations in examining this issue;

22 (2) gather information about missing youth cases and reasons why youth are reported missing;

23 (3) utilize data from the Youth Risk Behavior Survey;

24 (4) analyze rates and data of missing youth among specific subgroups, including but not limited to  
25 indigenous youth, ~~and~~ youth in foster care, AND YOUTH WHO GO MISSING MORE THAN ONCE; and

26 (5) examine efforts made by other states and jurisdictions to reduce the number of youth reported  
27 missing and decrease the amount of time for missing youth to be located and determine whether these  
28 approaches warrant adoption in Montana.
