11	Section 1. Section 3-1-1105, MCA, is amended to read:			
12	"3-1-1105. Confidential proceedings rules for commission. (1) Except as provided in 3-1-1107			
13	and 3-1-1121 through 3-1-1126, all papers filed with and proceedings before the commission or masters are			
14	confidential and the filing of papers with and the testimony given before the commission or masters is privileged			
15	communication.			
16	(2) The commission shall make rules for the conduct of its affairs and the enforcement of			
17	confidentiality and provide public disclosure when appropriate consistent with this part.			
18	(3) A complainant is not required to keep their complaint confidential."

20	Section 2. Section 3-1-1106, MCA, is amended to read:			
21	"3-1-1106. Investigation of judicial officers complaint hearing recommendations. (1) (a)			
22	The commission, upon the filing of a written complaint by any citizen of the state, may initiate an investigation of			
23	any judicial officer in the state to determine if there are grounds for conducting additional proceedings before			
24	the commission. If the commission's investigation indicates that additional proceedings before the commission			
25	may be justified, the commission shall require the citizen who filed the original written complaint to sign a			
26	verified written complaint before conducting additional proceedings.			
27	(b) The commission shall give the judicial officer written notice of the citizen's complaint and of the			
28	initiation of an investigation. Notice must also be given if a verified written complaint is filed and must include			



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the charges made, the grounds for the charges, and a statement that the judicial officer may file an answer. The
notice must be signed by the commission.

3 (2) The commission, after an investigation that it considers necessary and upon on a finding of
4 good cause, may shall:

5 (a) order a hearing to be held before it concerning the censure, suspension, removal, or retirement
6 of a judicial officer;

7 (b) confidentially <u>publicly</u> advise the judicial officer and the supreme court, in writing, that the 8 complaint will be dismissed if the judicial officer files with the commission a letter stating that the officer will take 9 corrective action satisfactory to the commission; or

- 10 (c) request that the supreme court appoint one or more special masters who are judges of courts
  11 of record to hear and take evidence and to report to the commission.
- (3) If after a hearing or after considering the record and the report of the masters the commission
   finds the charges true, it shall <u>publicly</u> recommend to the supreme court the censure, suspension, removal, or
   disability retirement of the judicial officer."

"3-1-1121. Public disclosure required. (1) If the commission finds good cause to order a hearing
 pursuant to 3-1-1106(2), the commission must allow public access to:

19 (1)(a) all papers pertaining to each finding of good cause, including charges that are later determined

20 not to be grounds for recommending retirement or disciplinary action to the supreme court;

21 (2)(b) the proceedings in which the commission or masters hear the charges against a judge; and

22 (3)(c) all transcripts or recordings of proceedings before the commission or masters pertaining to the

23 matters described in subsections (1) (1)(a) and (2) (1)(b).

24 (2) A complaint must be made public on request by a member of the public 5 years after

25 <u>dismissal.</u>"

4	(1)	confirm the pendency of the investigation;

6	(3)	explain the right of the judge to a fair hearing without prejudgment;			
7	(4)	state that the judge denies the allegations; or			
8	(5)	declare that there is insufficient evidence for a finding of good cause."
