4	A BILL FOR AN ACT ENTITLED: "AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF REVENUE FROM THE

7	CREATING AN EMERGENCY LODGING PROGRAM TO ASSIST VICTIMS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OR
8	HUMAN TRAFFICKING THAT IS ADMINISTERED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND
9	HUMAN SERVICES JUSTICE; PROVIDING THAT A GRANT IS NOT SUBJECT TO STATE
10	ACCOMMODATION TAXES; CREATING A STATE SPECIAL REVENUE ACCOUNT; PROVIDING
11	DEFINITIONS; PROVIDING RULEMAKING AUTHORITY; AMENDING SECTIONS 15-65-121, 15-68-101,
12	AND 90-1-135, MCA; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE, AND AN APPLICABILITY DATE, AND A
13	TERMINATION DATE."
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15	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
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17	NEW SECTION. Section 1. Emergency lodging program for victims of domestic violence or
18	human trafficking grants rulemaking definitions. (1) There is an emergency lodging program for
19	licensed establishments located in the state to assist designated charitable organizations in providing short-
20	term lodging in the state to individuals and families that are victims of domestic violence or human trafficking.
21	(2) (a) Subject to the provisions of this section, participating establishments may submit a grant
22	application to the department OF JUSTICE for providing emergency lodging to an individual or family who is in
23	immediate need of shelter based on being a victim of domestic violence or human trafficking.
24	(b) In order to be eligible for the grant, the individual or family must be referred to the
25	establishment by a designated charitable organization.
26	(3) Grant funds for the program are provided from funding in the emergency lodging for victims of
27	domestic violence or human trafficking state special revenue account provided for in [section 2]. The grant:
28	(a) is equal to the lesser of the average daily rate or the state rate for each night lodging was

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- 1 provided at no cost to the individual or the referring organization;
- 2 is limited to a maximum of 5 nights' lodging for each individual or family for each calendar year; (b)
- 3 (c) may be claimed only for lodging provided in the state; and
 - (d) is exempt from the lodging and facility use tax imposed by 15-65-111 or the sales tax and use tax on accommodations imposed by 15-68-102.
 - (4) Participating establishments may offer lodging based on availability of rooms.
 - (5) The department OF JUSTICE shall maintain a registry of designated charitable organizations and shall provide a list of approved organizations to establishments on request. The department OF JUSTICE shall seek comment from appropriate statewide nonprofit organizations when developing and updating the registry.
 - (6)The grants provided in this section are subject to available funding and are not guaranteed. The grant does not apply to the costs of providing lodging to an individual who is displaced by a major disaster declared by the president under 42 U.S.C. 5170 or 5191 and who receives financial assistance for temporary housing under 42 U.S.C. 5174.
 - The department OF JUSTICE may adopt rules, prepare forms, and maintain records that are (7) necessary to implement and administer this section.
 - (8) As used in this section, the following definitions apply:
 - (i) "Average daily rate" means the total amount of lodging receipts received by the (a) establishment during the night of the emergency stay without regard to local and state taxes received divided by the number of rooms the establishment received compensation for during the night of the emergency stay.
 - (ii) The term does not include grant money received pursuant to this section.
- "Designated charitable organization" has the meaning provided in 50-51-114 MEANS A (b) CHARITABLE ORGANIZATION OR GOVERNMENT ENTITY APPROVED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE TO MAKE REFERRALS 23 FOR EMERGENCY LODGING.
 - "Establishment" means a person or entity that makes sales of accommodations as defined in (c) 15-68-101.
- 26 (d) "State rate" means the rate the state pays for state employees in travel status that is adopted by the department of administration. 27



NEW SECTION. Section 2. Emergency lodging for victims of domestic violence or human trafficking account. (1) There is an emergency lodging for victims of domestic violence or human trafficking account in the state special revenue fund. The account is administered by the department OF JUSTICE.

- (2) The revenue allocated to the account as provided in 15-65-121(2)(f) must be deposited in the account and distributed as provided in [section 1].
- (3) Money in the account is subject to legislative appropriation and must be used to provide grants to licensed establishments that provide short-term lodging in the state to individuals and families that are victims of domestic violence or human trafficking pursuant to [section 1].

Section 3. Section 15-65-121, MCA, is amended to read:

- "15-65-121. (Temporary) Distribution of tax proceeds. (1) The proceeds of the tax imposed by 15-65-111 must, in accordance with the provisions of 17-2-124, be deposited in an account in the state special revenue fund to the credit of the department. The department may spend from that account in accordance with an expenditure appropriation by the legislature based on an estimate of the costs of collecting and disbursing the proceeds of the tax. Before allocating the balance of the tax proceeds in accordance with the provisions of 17-2-124 and as provided in subsections (2)(a) through (2)(i) (2)(j) of this section, the department shall determine the expenditures by state agencies for in-state lodging for each reporting period and deduct 4% of that amount from the tax proceeds received each reporting period. The department shall distribute the portion of the 4% that was paid with federal funds to the agency that made the in-state lodging expenditure and deposit 30% of the amount deducted less the portion paid with federal funds in the state general fund.
- The balance of the tax proceeds received each reporting period and not deducted pursuant to the expenditure appropriation, deposited in the state general fund, distributed to agencies that paid the tax with federal funds, or deposited in the heritage preservation and development account must be transferred to an account in the state special revenue fund to the credit of the department of commerce for tourism promotion and promotion of the state as a location for the production of motion pictures and television commercials, to the emergency lodging for victims of domestic violence or human trafficking account, to the Montana historical interpretation state special revenue account, to the Montana historical society, to the university system, to the state-tribal economic development commission, and to the department of fish, wildlife, and parks, as follows:

- (4) If a regional nonprofit tourism corporation fails to submit and gain approval for an annual marketing plan as required in 15-65-122, then those funds otherwise allocated to the regional nonprofit tourism corporation may be used by the department of commerce for tourism promotion and promotion of the state as a location for the production of motion pictures and television commercials.
- (5) The tax proceeds received that are transferred to a state special revenue account pursuant to subsections (2)(a) through (2)(c), (2)(e), and (2)(f) (2)(g) are statutorily appropriated to the entities as provided in 17-7-502.
- (6) The tax proceeds received that are transferred to the invasive species state special revenue account pursuant to subsection (2)(d), to the Montana historical interpretation state special revenue account pursuant to subsection (2)(h) (2)(i), and to the Montana heritage preservation and development account pursuant to subsection (2)(i) (2)(j) are subject to appropriation by the legislature. (Terminates June 30, 2027-sec. 12, Ch. 563, L. 2021.)
- 15-65-121. (Effective July 1, 2027) Distribution of tax proceeds. (1) The proceeds of the tax imposed by 15-65-111 must, in accordance with the provisions of 17-2-124, be deposited in an account in the state special revenue fund to the credit of the department. The department may spend from that account in accordance with an expenditure appropriation by the legislature based on an estimate of the costs of collecting and disbursing the proceeds of the tax. Before allocating the balance of the tax proceeds in accordance with the provisions of 17-2-124 and as provided in subsections (2)(a) through (2)(h) (2)(i) of this section, the department shall determine the expenditures by state agencies for in-state lodging for each reporting period and deduct 4% of that amount from the tax proceeds received each reporting period. The department shall distribute the portion of the 4% that was paid with federal funds to the agency that made the in-state lodging expenditure and deposit 30% of the amount deducted less the portion paid with federal funds in the state general fund. The amount of \$400,000 each year must be deposited in the Montana heritage preservation and development account provided for in 22-3-1004.
 - (2) The balance of the tax proceeds received each reporting period and not deducted pursuant to



the expenditure appropriation, deposited in the state general fund, distributed to agencies that paid the tax with		
federal funds, or deposited in the heritage preservation and development account must be transferred to an		
account in the state special revenue fund to the credit of the department of commerce for tourism promotion		
and promotion of the state as a location for the production of motion pictures and television commercials, to the		
emergency lodging for victims of domestic violence or human trafficking account, to the Montana historical		
interpretation state special revenue account, to the Montana historical society, to the university system, to the		
state-tribal economic development commission, and to the department of fish, wildlife, and parks, as follows:		
(a) 1% to the Montana historical society to be used for the installation or maintenance of roadside		
historical signs and historic sites;		
(b) 2.5% to the university system for the establishment and maintenance of a Montana travel		
research program;		
(c) 6.5% to the department of fish, wildlife, and parks for the maintenance of facilities in state parks		
that have both resident and nonresident use;		
(d) 1.4% to the invasive species state special revenue account established in 80-7-1004;		
(e) 63%62.9% to be used directly by the department of commerce;		
(f) 0.1% to the emergency lodging for victims of domestic violence or human trafficking account		
established in [section 2].		
(f)(g) (i) except as provided in subsection (2)(f)(ii) (2)(g)(ii), 22.5% to be distributed by the department		
to regional nonprofit tourism corporations in the ratio of the proceeds collected in each tourism region to the		
total proceeds collected statewide; and		

- (ii) if 22.5% of the proceeds collected annually within the limits of a city, consolidated city-county, resort area, or resort area district exceeds \$35,000, 50% of the amount available for distribution to the regional nonprofit tourism corporation in the region where the city, consolidated city-county, resort area, or resort area district is located, to be distributed to the nonprofit convention and visitors bureau in that city, consolidated city-county, resort area, or resort area district;
- (g)(h) 0.5% to the state special revenue account provided for in 90-1-135 for use by the state-tribal economic development commission established in 90-1-131 for activities in the Indian tourism region; and
 - (h)(i) 2.6% to the Montana historical interpretation state special revenue account established in 22-3-

- (3) If a city, consolidated city-county, resort area, or resort area district qualifies under 15-68-820(5)(b)(iii) or this section for funds but fails to either recognize a nonprofit convention and visitors bureau or submit and gain approval for an annual marketing plan as required in 15-65-122, then those funds must be allocated to the regional nonprofit tourism corporation in the region in which the city, consolidated city-county, resort area, or resort area district is located.
- (4) If a regional nonprofit tourism corporation fails to submit and gain approval for an annual marketing plan as required in 15-65-122, then those funds otherwise allocated to the regional nonprofit tourism corporation may be used by the department of commerce for tourism promotion and promotion of the state as a location for the production of motion pictures and television commercials.
- (5) The tax proceeds received that are transferred to a state special revenue account pursuant to subsections (2)(a) through (2)(c), (2)(e), and (2)(f) (2)(g) are statutorily appropriated to the entities as provided in 17-7-502.
- (6) The tax proceeds received that are transferred to the invasive species state special revenue account pursuant to subsection (2)(d) and to the Montana historical interpretation state special revenue account pursuant to subsection (2)(h) (2)(i) are subject to appropriation by the legislature."

- **Section 4.** Section 15-68-101, MCA, is amended to read:
- "15-68-101. **Definitions.** For purposes of this chapter, unless the context requires otherwise, the following definitions apply:
 - (1) (a) "Accommodations" means short-term rentals or individual sleeping rooms, suites, camping spaces, or other units offered for overnight lodging periods of less than 30 days to the general public for compensation.
 - (b) Accommodations include units located in property represented to the public as a hotel, motel, campground, resort, dormitory, condominium inn, dude ranch, guest ranch, hostel, public lodginghouse, bed and breakfast facility, vacation home, home, apartment, timeshare, room, or rooms rented by or on behalf of the owner or seller.
- 28 (c) The term does not include:



1	(i)	a health care facility, as defined in 50-5-101;
2	(ii)	any facility owned by a corporation organized under Title 35, chapter 2 or 3;
3	(iii)	a facility that is used primarily by persons under 18 years of age for camping purposes; or

20	(8)	"Purchaser" means a person to whom a sale of accommodations or a rental vehicle is made or	
21	to whom a service is furnished.		
22	(9)	"Rental vehicle" means a motor vehicle that is used for or by a person other than the owner of	
23	the motor vehicle through an arrangement and for consideration.		
24	(10)	"Retail sale" means any sale, lease, or rental for any purpose other than for resale, sublease,	
25	or subrent.		
26	(11)	(a) "Sale" or "selling" means the rental or use of accommodations or rental vehicles for	
27	consideration or the performance of a service for consideration.

- 5 leased, or rented or valued in money, whether received in money or otherwise, without any deduction for the

- 7 (i) the seller's cost of the property sold;
- 8 (ii) the cost of materials used, labor or service costs, interest, losses, all costs of transportation to 9 the seller, all taxes imposed on the seller, and any other expense of the seller;

- 11 (iv) delivery charges; or

- 13 (b) The amount received for charges listed in subsections (12)(a)(ii) through (12)(a)(v) are
 14 excluded from the sales price if they are separately stated on the invoice, billing, or similar document given to
 15 the purchaser and the charge is not subject to subsection (12)(d).
- 16 (c) The term does not include:
- 17 (i) charges for meals, transportation, entertainment, or any other similar charges; or
- 18 (ii) any taxes legally imposed directly on the consumer that are separately stated on the invoice,
 19 bill of sale, or similar document given to the purchaser.
- 20 (d) Unless specifically excluded, sales price includes any separate charge or fee that a purchaser
 21 must pay to facilitate the sale or rental of the accommodations or rental vehicle, including a fee or a service,
 22 commission, or other charge by an online hosting platform.
- 23 (13) "Sales tax" and "use tax" mean the applicable tax imposed by 15-68-102.
 - (14) "Seller" means a person that makes sales of accommodations or rental vehicles, including an online hosting platform.
 - (15) (a) "Service" means an activity that is engaged in for another person for consideration and that is distinguished from the sale or lease of accommodations or rental vehicles. Service includes activities performed by an online hosting platform.



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1	(b)	In determining what a service is, the intended use, principal objective, or ultimate objective o
2	the contracting	parties is irrelevant.

- (16) "Short-term rental" means any individually or collectively owned single-family house or dwelling unit or any unit or group of units in a condominium, cooperative, timeshare, or owner-occupied residential home that is offered for a fee for 30 days or less.
- (17) "Short-term rental marketplace" means a person that provides a platform through which a seller or the authorized agent of the seller offers a short-term rental to an occupant.
- (18) "Timeshare" means any facility for which multiple parties or individuals own a right to use the facility for lodging purposes, and these parties or individuals do not hold claim to ownership of the physical property."

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- **Section 5.** Section 90-1-135, MCA, is amended to read:
- "90-1-135. Special revenue accounts. (1) There is a state special revenue account in the state treasury for the receipt of state and private funds and a federal special revenue account in the state treasury for the receipt of federal funds for expenditure by the state-tribal economic development commission established in 90-1-131.
- 17 (2) Money in the state special revenue account from proceeds distributed under 15-65-18 121(2)(g)(2)(h) is to be used for activities for the Indian tourism region, defined in 15-65-101.
- 19 (3) Except as provided in subsection (2), money in the accounts established in subsection (1) must 20 be used to pay:
 - (a) the commission's administrative costs;
- 22 (b) the salary, benefits, and administrative expenses of the tribal business center coordinator and 23 the federal grants coordinator; and
 - (c) the costs of conducting or commissioning and periodically updating or otherwise modifying a comprehensive assessment of economic development needs and priorities on each of the Indian reservations in the state.
- 27 (4) Money in the accounts that is not expended for the purposes identified in subsection (2) or (3) 28 may be used for other purposes that the commission considers prudent or necessary.



1	(5) Interest and income earned on the money in the accounts must be deposited in the accounts
2	for the commission's use."

5	as an integral part of Title 50 44, chapter 51 4, part 1 15, and the provisions of Title 50 44, chapter 51 4, part 1
6	15, apply to [sections 1 and 2].
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8	NEW SECTION. Section 7. Effective date. [This act] is effective July 1, 2023.
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10	NEW SECTION. Section 8. Applicability. [This act] applies to sales of accommodations or
11	campgrounds that occur on or after [the effective date of this act] and to the use of accommodations or
12	campgrounds on or after [the effective date of this act], even if the sale occurred before [the effective date of
13	this act].
