MESSAGES FROM THE GOVERNOR

April 17, 2023

Dear President Ellsworth and Speaker Regier:

I share your profound commitment to protect Montana children from invasive medical treatments that can permanently alter their healthy, developing bodies, and I appreciate the Legislature's effort to that end with **Senate Bill 99**, **the Youth Health Protection Act**.

I've sat down and met with transgender youth and adults. I understand their struggles are real, and my heart goes out to them. I firmly believe that, as with all of God's children, Montanans who struggle with their gender identity deserve love, compassion, and respect.

As you know, Senate Bill 99 does not prohibit thoughtful, noninvasive care as a response to those who struggle with gender identity. Senate Bill 99 does not prohibit social affirmation. And Senate Bill 99 does not prohibit providing or accessing psychotherapy to treat young Montanans struggling with their gender identity.

Instead, Senate Bill 99 focuses on so-called gender affirming medical care for children. "Gender affirming care" for children is Orwellian Newspeak, a seemingly innocuous, even solicitous phrase that masks its true nature of permanent, invasive, life-altering medical and surgical procedures, performed on children whose young minds and bodies are still developing.

The science around puberty blockers, hormonal treatments, and sex-reassignment surgeries is unsettled and continues to evolve. Western and northern European countries, as well as many states, recognize this reality. Sex-reassignment surgery is not performed on individuals under the age of 18 in the United Kingdom, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, Luxembourg, and Sweden.

And yet, children as young as 12 years of age have received sex-reassignment surgery in the United States, and children as young as 8 years of age have been prescribed puberty blockers in the United States.

Given the unsettled, evolving science around invasive medical treatments for children struggling with gender identity, it is right and appropriate to protect young Montanans from these permanent, life-altering procedures.

I appreciate the Legislature's work to protect Montana children with Senate Bill 99, and I support the sponsor's efforts and intent. As currently written, I believe the legislation is incomplete and can be strengthened.

Therefore, in accordance with the power vested in me as Governor by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Montana, I hereby return with amendments Senate Bill 99: "AN ACT PROVIDING FOR A YOUTH HEALTH PROTECTION ACT; PROHIBITING CERTAIN MEDICAL AND SURGICAL TREATMENTS TO TREAT MINORS WITH GENDER DYSPHORIA; PROHIBITING PUBLIC FUNDS, PROGRAMS, PROPERTY, AND EMPLOYEES FROM BEING USED FOR THESE TREATMENTS; PROVIDING THAT A HEALTH CARE PROFESSIONAL WHO VIOLATES THIS LAW COMMITS PROFESSIONAL MISCONDUCT; PROVIDING A PRIVATE CAUSE OF ACTION; PROHIBITING DISCHARGE OF PROFESSIONAL LIABILITY VIA INSURANCE; AND PROVIDING DEFINITIONS."

As currently written, Senate Bill 99 provides an imprecise definition of "male" and "female." As currently written, the bill does not contemplate treatment for a child requiring a necessary medical procedure because he or she was born with a medically verifiable disorder of sex development. Finally, as currently written, the bill is unclear about public funding restrictions.

The amendments I offer ensure that the necessarily binary definitions of "male" and "female" encompass all members of the human race. For example, the addition of "would produce" makes clear that young children, who are still undergoing biological development, nevertheless fall within the definition of "male" or female."

The amendments I offer recognize that biological or genetic conditions, including but not limited to the circumstances of menopause, being intersex, or a cancer diagnosis requiring surgical

removal of reproductive organs, do not preclude an individual from still meeting the definition of "male" or "female."

Finally, the amendments I offer also ensure that the scope of public funding restrictions matches the prohibitions on not just "procedures," but on all medical treatments identified in Senate Bill 99. This ensures that the exceptions to the prohibitions apply with equal force to public funding and removes vagueness from the law as to its meaning and scope.

I thank the sponsor for his work on Senate Bill 99 and support of the amendments I offer.

For these reasons, I respectfully ask for your support of these amendments,

Senate Bill 99 protects Montana children from permanent, life-altering medical procedures until they are adults, mature enough to make such serious health decisions.

He continued to use the old sawmill his father had put together for cutting mine timbers and construction work in the early 1900s and began harvesting logs and cutting lumber for his own property while selling lumber as a side business, which turned into Marks Lumber. In 1982 Bob and Barb decided to build a small bar and restaurant in Clancy. This became the Legal Tender Cafe.

After serving on a school board, Bob chose to enter politics. In 1968 he ran a successful campaign for the State Legislature in his home house district. For the next twenty years, he represented this district, while holding Republican leadership positions: Speaker Pro Tempore, Minority Whip, Republican Leader and two terms as Speaker of the House. He also chaired the Western District Council of State Governments, and in 1989 newly elected Governor Stan Stevens appointed Bob to head the Department of Administration. He had learned the art of compromise and gained the friendship of hundreds of people on both sides of the aisle. Bob's campaign slogan was "Make your mark for Marks." He left his mark with his family: wisdom, integrity, work ethic, and love.

Bob was preceded in death by his parents, his Aunt Myrtle, brother Doug, and in infant grandson Dallas. "Art" Noonan on March 6, 2022 on Saturday, September 17, 2022 in Butte. He was 70 years old. Art Noonan was born on November 24, 1951, one of six children of Edward J. and Sara L. Noonan. He grew up on Whitman Avenue, attended St. John's School and graduated from Butte Central High School in 1970.

In 1971 Art received statewide publicity for being the first young person to vote in Silver Bow County after the 1969 law lowering the voting age from 21 to 19. In his early twenties, he was invited to address several legislative sessions where he paced up and down the center aisles in period costume as Thomas Jefferson, extolling the virtues of the Declaration of Independence and the U.S. Constitution.

Art worked on the staff of former U.S. Representative Pat Williams, focusing on natural resources and wilderness issues. He also worked for Senator John Melcher. He ended his congressional career in Congressman Williams' Butte field office.

Art served three terms, the 2005, 2007 and 2009 sessions as a Democrat in the Montana House of Representatives from House District 73 in Butte. In 2007 he was the Democratic Floor Leader tasked with helping support the agenda of Governor Brian Schweitzer, who later named Art Deputy Director of Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks from 2009 to 2011. Art was also the Executive Director of the Montana Democratic Party from 2007-2009. People have said about Art that he had "the knack to disagree vehemently without being disagreeable." At the time of his death, Art was once again running for House District 73.

Art served on the Butte-Silver Bow Planning Board and the Montana Supreme Court Commission on Practices. He was executive director of the AWARE Foundation and worked for Northwestern Energy advising the company on governmental affairs from 2012 until his retirement in 2017.

Art was preceded in death by his parents and brothers Ed and Larry. He is survived by his sisters Winifred Noonan, Sara Paul, brother Mark, nephews Pat Noonan, Dan Paul, Bryan Noonan and nieces Andrea Bottorff, Kate Williamsen and Kelley Paul. Art loved several cats throughout his life, and his most recent buddy, Skinny Cat, will miss him dearly.

HAROLD LEE PAULSEN

WHEREAS, it is with deep and sincere sorrow that the members of the Sixty-Eighth Legislative Assembly of the State of Montana record the passing of Harold Lee Paulsen, on August 21, 2015 at age 98. Harold Paulsen was a well-known insurance and investment representative, popular singer and speaker who was born on February 21, 1917. He was the oldest of six children born to Paul and Elfreda Paulsen in Helena. In 1947 Harold married Betty Sanford, and they raised four children.

Harold joined the Army in 1941. He was accepted to Officer Candidate School and received his commission as an air Force Statistical Officer from Harvard School of Business Administration. He served with the 8th Air Force in England for 28 months and was discharged in December 1945 with the rank of Captain.

After the service Harold began a long career in life insurance in Helena. In 2001 he was honored at the home office of The Hartford Company on the occasion of his 65th anniversary with the company, a longer tenure than any other individual. He belonged to the Jaycees and was inducted as a Charter Member of the National Jaycees Hall of Leadership at Tulsa, Oklahoma in 1983. He was devoted to his church, leading the effort to build a new church.

Harold served as a member was a member of the state legislature, and his children remember hanging campaign signs with their dad. He served in the House of Representatives during the 1957 and 1959 sessions.

Harold will be remembered for his great tenor voice. He sang for most of the Montana governors during his lifetime, and once shared the stage with the late Norman Vincent Peale. He sang in groups, choirs, recordings, and solo performances across the U.S. and in England, Norway, and Denmark. He was a featured singer at the Governor's Prayer breakfast from its start in the 1960s.

After the job was done, he asked her where she wanted to go, and she responded, "Take me to Montana."

Within a week they had driven to Montana, made an offer on a house and some land to be used to build a manufacturing plant, and changed their license plate to Montana. They bought the house his wife still lives in.

Having been interested in politics since he was a young boy, Gary decided it was time to give back. He won a seat in the Montana State Senate in 2003 and served in the Senate through 2009. Senator Perry was famous for his 41-minute opening on a bill. He was a member of the Judiciary and Natural Resources committee. He also was chairman of the Gallatin County Republican Central Committee, the Chamber of Commerce, the Rotary, and the NRA.

Gary is survived by his wife Lisa and their son Travis.

ARTHUR L. PETERSON

Shortly before going to Korea, he had married Connie Lucille Harr.

During a career which combined a continuing interest in higher education and politics, he served for 20 years as a college professor in the field of political science at the University of Wisconsin (Eau Claire) and Ohio Wesleyan, and as a college dean and president for 16 years at the American Graduate School of International Management, Lebanon Valley College, and Eckerd College. In the late 1990s Art served as the Scott Professor of Leadership at Rocky Mountain College in Billings. He was elected as a member of the 2001 State House of Representatives and served on the Appropriations Committee.

Art was preceded in death by his parents, brothers and sisters, his wife Connie of 50 years and a son. He is succeeded by his wife Mary as well as by her children and family, his children, grandchildren, and many friends.

He was a master woodworker, a hobby where he made most of the furniture in his house, the kitchen and bathroom cabinets, outdoor large planters and remade the decks around the house. There wasn't a project he couldn't do. He also loved classical music, operas, reading books, talking to people and having pet dogs and cats.

JONAS ROSENTHAL

He was responsible for establishing the river's walleye population, gathering walleye eggs downstream from the intake on the Yellowstone. Those eggs spawned the walleye program at Miles City fish hatchery.

That success led to Sweeney working to improve Montana fish populations as far west as Lake Koocanusa in Libby. He eventually became manager of the Washoe Park Trout Hatchery in Anaconda, where biologists developed the population of genetically pure west slope cutthroat used to re-populate the fish to their historic Montana territories.

Mark grew up on the Yellowstone River, hunting and navigating in a small kayak. "He was like a Huckleberry Finn," said his friend Chris Marchion of Anaconda. "He knew all the islands. He really knew that river. He would float all the time in that little kayak."

Mark's deeply seated values compelled him to serve the public. He began as a county commissioner, then a member of the Montana House of Representatives in the 2019 session and the State Senate in the 2021 session. He represented an area that stretches from Drummond to Walkerville in the northern reaches of Butte. He was engaged in a campaign for a seat in the U.S. House of Representatives at the time of his death.

WILLIAM EUGENE "GENE" VUCKOVICH

WHEREAS, it is with deep and sincere sorrow that the members of the Sixty-Eighth Legislative Assembly of the State of Montana record the passing of William Eugene "Gene" Vuckovich on July 12, 2022 at the age of 86. It is fitting and proper that the record and accomplishments of the late Gene Vuckovich filed on the official records of this Assembly, and the following facts relative to his career are hereby noted:

Gene Vuckovich was born in Anaconda on March 9, 1936, to Daniel and Donnie (Elakovich) Vuckovich. He joined his older siblings Jack and Nada to create a loving family unit with a fierce devotion to one another. He was only 7 years old when his father suddenly passed away, but he believed these hard times helped develop his strong work ethic, sense of service to others and dedication to his community.

He met the beautiful and charming Noreen Opie at high school, and she became the love of his life. They were married on August 31, 1957. He received a scholarship from Western Montana College, earning a Bachelor of Arts degree in education, majoring in English and social studies. He completed graduate work at the University of Montana and University of Utah, earning a Master of Science degree in mathematics and physics. He taught and coached in the Anaconda school system and also worked as a journeyman ironworker in the summer and school breaks to help support his family. He felt privileged to be part of the crew of "men on the mountain," a group of ironworkers from Local 81 that helped assemble Our Lady of the Rockies.

Gene changed career paths and served as the Director of the Montana Concentrated Employment Program, and for over 16 years served as the Director/Coordinator for the Montana Ironworkers' Apprenticeship Program.
