16	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MONTANA:
17	
18	NEW SECTION. Section 1. Short title. [Sections 1 through 17] may be cited as the "Community
19	Choice Schools Act".
20	
21	NEW SECTION. Section 2. Community choice schools legislative findings and intent. (1) The
22	egislature finds, pursuant to the authority and duties provided in Article X, section 1(3), of the Montana
23	constitution, that:
24	(a) parents desire education options for their children;
25	(b) expanding educational opportunities for K-12 education within the state is a valid public
26	purpose; and
27	(c) creating options that empower parents, encourage students to develop their full educational
28	potential, provide a variety of professional opportunities for teachers, and encourage educational



1	entrepreneursh	ip is vital to the economic competitiveness of the state.
2	(2)	It is the legislature's intent, pursuant to the authority and duties provided in Article X, section
3	1(3), of the Mor	ntana constitution, to create other public educational programs and institutions through choice
4	schools. The p	urposes are to:
5	(a)	enable parents to make decisions on how best to educate their children;
6	(b)	provide other public educational opportunities for all students, especially those at risk of
7	academic failur	e or academic disengagement;
8	(c)	encourage the use of different models of teaching, governing, scheduling, and providing
9	instruction to m	eet a wide variety of student and community needs; and
10	(d)	advance Montana's commitment to the preservation of American Indian cultural identity,
11	pursuant to Arti	icle X, section 1(2), of the Montana constitution, and to eliminate the American Indian
12	achievement ga	ap by encouraging participation in the choice school program by students, parents, and school
13	districts in India	an country.
14		
15	NEW S	ECTION. Section 3. Definitions. As used in [sections 1 through 17], the following definitions
16	apply:	
17	(1)	"Applicant" means a person or group that submits a proposal for a community choice school to
18	an authorizer.	
19	(2)	"Authorizer" means the commission or a local school board approved as an authorizer by the
20	commission.	
21	(3)	"Charter contract" means a fixed-term, renewable contract between a community choice school
22	and an authoriz	zer that outlines the roles, powers, responsibilities, and performance expectations for each party
23	to the contract.	
24	(4)	"Commission" means the community choice school commission provided for in [section 4].
25	(5)	"Community choice school" or "choice school" means a public school that:
26	(a)	has autonomy over decisions, including but not limited to matters concerning finance, board
27	governance, pe	ersonnel, scheduling, curriculum, and instruction;
28	(b)	is governed by a governing board;



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1	(c)	is established and operated under the terms of a charter contract between the school's

11	(6)	"Education service provider" means a for-profit education management organization, nonpro	ofit
12	education man	agement organization, school design provider, or other partner entity with which a community	1
13	choice school i	ntends to contract for educational design, implementation, or comprehensive management.	
14	(7)	"Governing board" means an independent volunteer board of trustees of a community choic	e
15	school that is a	a party to the charter contract with the authorizer.	
16	(8)	"Local school board" means a traditional school district board of trustees exercising	
17	management a	and control over a traditional local school district pursuant to the laws of the state.	
18	(9)	"Parent" means a parent, guardian, or other person or entity having legal custody of a child.	
19	(10)	"Resident school district" means the public school district in which a student resides.	
20	(11)	"Student" means a child who is eligible for attendance in a public school in the state.	
21	(12)	"Traditional public school" means a traditional public school that is under the direct	
22	management, g	governance, and control of a local school board or the state.	
23	(13)	"Virtual community choice school" means a community choice school headquartered in	
24	Montana that o	ffers educational services predominantly through an online program.	
25			
26	<u>NEW S</u>	SECTION. Section 4. Community choice school commission appointments. (1) There	e is
27	an autonomous	s state community choice school commission with statewide authorizing jurisdiction and	
28	authority. The o	commission is attached to the board of public education for administrative purposes, as	
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- 1 prescribed in 2-15-121(2), except as provided in this section, and is under the general supervision of the board
- 2 of public education as set forth in this section.
- 3 (2) The commission is responsible for approving authorizers for choice schools throughout the
  4 state.
- 5 (3) The commission consists of seven members who are appointed as follows:
- 6 (a) two members appointed by the governor;
- 7 (b) one member appointed by the superintendent of public instruction
- 8 (c) one member appointed by the president of the senate;
- 9 (d) one member appointed by the speaker of the house;
- 10 (e) one member appointed by the minority leader of the senate; and
- 11 (f) one member appointed by the minority leader of the house of representatives.
- 12 (4) Members appointed to the commission must collectively possess substantial experience and

13 expertise in board governance, business, finance, education, management, and philanthropy. All members of

- 14 the commission must have a demonstrated understanding of and commitment to choice schools as a strategy
- 15 for strengthening public education.
- 16 (5) (a) Initial appointments to the commission must be for staggered terms as follows:
- (i) 4-year terms for the appointees of the governor, one of whom must be designated by the
  governor as the initial presiding officer of the commission for 2 years;
- (ii) 3-year terms for the appointees of the superintendent of public instruction and the minority
  leaders of the senate and house of representatives; and

- 21 (iii) 2-year terms for the appointees of the president of the senate and speaker of the house.
- 22 (b) All terms after the initial term must be for 3 years. Appointment to the initial terms must be
- made no later than 60 days following [the effective date of this act]. If any of the appointing authorities fails to
- 24 make the appointments, the remaining appointing authorities may make the remaining appointments.
- 25 (6) Each member of the commission is entitled to reimbursement for expenses upon approval of
  26 the treasurer of the commission as provided in the commission's bylaws.
- 27 (7) A member of the commission may be removed by a majority vote of the commission for any
  28 cause that renders the member unable or unfit to discharge the duties of the office, including but not limited to



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1 failure to approve an authorizer or a choice school without just cause and interference with the functions of the 2 commission as set forth in [sections 1 through 17]. Whenever a vacancy on the commission exists, the original 3 appointing authority shall appoint a member for the remaining portion of the term consistent with the 4 requirements of subsections (4) and (5). 5 (8) The commission is authorized to receive and expend gifts and donations of any kind from any 6 private entity. The gifts and donations may not require conditions that do not comport with the purposes of 7 [sections 1 through 17]. Gifts and donations under this subsection must be deposited in the community choice 8 school account pursuant to [section 17] and may be used by the commission for commission operations or 9 distributed to choice schools at the discretion of the commission. 10 (9)The commission may hire staff for the commission. Support staff may be provided by the board 11 of public education for centralized services, including payroll, human resources, accounting, information 12 technology, or other services, if those services are determined by the commission and the board to be more 13 efficiently provided by the board. 14 The commission shall convene and approve bylaws and officers within 180 days of [the (10)15 effective date of this act]. 16 (11)All commission meetings are open to the public pursuant to Article II, section 9, of the Montana 17 constitution and 2-3-203. 18 (12)By August 1 of each year, the commission shall annually report to the state board of public 19 education the academic performance and financial reports of each choice school authorized within the state. 20 21 NEW SECTION. Section 5. Authorizers. (1) The state community choice school commission created 22 under [section 4] may authorize choice schools in the state. The commission shall perform the functions of 23 choice school authorizers under [sections 1 through 17]. 24 (2) (a) A local school board may apply to the commission for authorizing authority within the 25 boundaries of the traditional school district overseen by the local school board. 26 (b) If the commission determines that the local school board fulfills the requirements of an authorizer, the commission shall, within 60 days of receipt of a local school board's application, approve the 27 28 local school board as an authorizer.



1	(C)	On approval, the commission shall register the local school board and shall provide the local
2	school board w	ith a letter confirming its approval as an authorizer.
3	(3)	(a) The commission shall establish the annual application and approval process, including
4	cycles and dea	dlines during the fiscal year, for local school boards to apply for authorizing authority as set forth
5	in this section.	
6	(b)	By March 1 of each year, the commission shall make available information and guidelines for
7	local school bo	ards concerning the opportunity to apply for authorizing authority under [sections 1 through 17].
8	(c)	Each interested local school board shall submit an application that clearly explains or presents
9	the following el	ements in a format to be established by the commission:
10	(i)	written notification of intent to serve as a choice school authorizer in accordance with [sections
11	1 through 17];	
12	(ii)	an explanation of the local school board's strategic vision for authorizing;
13	(iii)	a plan supporting the local school board's strategic vision and an explanation of the local
14	school board's	budget and personnel capacity and commitment to execute the duties of choice school
15	authorizing in a	ccordance with [sections 1 through 17];
16	(iv)	a draft or preliminary outline of a request for proposal that will solicit choice school applicants in
17	accordance wit	h [section 9];
18	(v)	a description or outline of the performance framework the local school board will use to guide
19	the establishme	ent of a charter contract and for ongoing oversight and evaluation of choice schools consistent
20	with the require	ments of [sections 1 through 17];
21	(vi)	a draft of the local school board's renewal, revocation, nonrenewal, and school closure
22	processes cons	sistent with [sections 12 and 13];
23	(vii)	a statement of assurance that the local school board commits to serving as a choice school
24	authorizer in ful	fillment of the expectations, spirit, and intent of [sections 1 through 17] and will fully participate
25	in any authorize	er training provided or required by the commission; and
26	(viii)	a statement of assurance that the local school board will be accountable and transparent in all
27	matters concer	ning authorizing practices, decisions, and expenditures.
28	(4)	(a) Within 60 days of receipt of the application, the commission shall determine whether to



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1 approve an application based on a review of the documentation provided in subsection (5) and the quality of the 2 application. The commission shall provide a letter to the local school board either confirming or denying 3 acceptance as an authorizer. 4 (b) Within 30 days of approval of an application for choice school authorizing, the commission and 5 the approved authorizer shall execute a renewable authorizing contract. The initial authorizing contract term is 6 6 years. 7 (5) A local school board may not engage in authorizing functions without a fully executed 8 authorizing contract. 9 When approved by the commission, the local school board continues as an authorizer from (6)10 year to year during the term of the contract as long as the local school board fulfills all authorizing duties and 11 expectations set forth in [sections 1 through 17] and remains an authorizer in good standing with the 12 commission. 13 14 NEW SECTION. Section 6. Authorizer responsibilities. (1) In accordance with [sections 1 through 15 17], an authorizer is responsible for executing the following essential powers and duties: 16 (a) soliciting and evaluating choice school proposals; 17 approving choice school proposals that meet identified educational needs and promote a (b) 18 diversity of educational choices, including but not limited to: 19 (i) creating more schools with high standards for pupil performance; 20 (ii) closing achievement gaps between high-performing and low-performing groups of public 21 school students; 22 (iii) increasing educational opportunities within the public education system; 23 (iv) providing alternative learning environments for students who are not thriving in traditional 24 school settings; 25 (v) addressing the dropout rate; creating new professional opportunities for teachers, leaders, and other school personnel: 26 (vi) 27 (vii) encouraging the use of innovative models of teaching, delivering content, and providing other 28 aspects of K-12 education; and



1	(viii)	providing students, parents, community members, and other local and philanthropic entities
2	with expanded	opportunities for involvement in the public education system;
3	(C)	declining to approve inadequate choice school proposals;
4	(d)	negotiating and executing sound charter contracts with each approved choice school;
5	(e)	monitoring, in accordance with charter contract terms, the performance and legal compliance of
6	choice schools	; and
7	(f)	determining whether each charter contract merits renewal, nonrenewal, or revocation.
8	(2)	An authorizer may delegate its duties to its officers, employees, and contractors.
9	(3)	Regulation of choice schools by authorizers is limited to the powers and duties described in
10	[sections 1 thro	ough 17], consistent with the intent of [sections 1 through 17].
11	(4)	An authorizer shall develop, carry out, and maintain authorizing policies and practices
12	consistent with	nationally recognized principles and standards for authorizing in all major areas of authorizing
13	responsibility,	including:
14	(a)	organizational capacity and infrastructure;
15	(b)	soliciting and evaluating choice school proposals;
16	(c)	performance contracting;
17	(d)	ongoing community choice school oversight and evaluation; and
18	(e)	charter contract renewal decisionmaking.
19	(5)	Evidence of material or persistent failure to carry out the duties enumerated in this section
20	constitutes gro	ounds for rescission of authorizing powers by the commission.
21	(6)	Each authorizer shall submit to the commission an annual report summarizing:
22	(a)	the authorizer's strategic vision for authorizing and progress toward achieving that vision;
23	(b)	the academic and financial performance of all operating choice schools overseen by the
24	authorizer, acc	cording to the performance expectations for choice schools set forth in [sections 1 through 17];
25	(c)	the status of the authorizer's choice school portfolio, identifying all choice schools approved but
26	not yet open, c	operating, renewed, transferred, revoked, not renewed, voluntarily closed, or never opened;
27	(d)	the authorizing functions provided by the authorizer to the choice schools under its direction,
28	including the a	uthorizer's operating costs and expenses detailed in annual audited financial statements that



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1 conform with generally accepted accounting principles; and 2 the services purchased from the authorizer by a choice school under the authorizer's direction, (e) 3 including an itemized accounting of the actual costs of these services, as required in [section 7]. 4 (7) An employee, trustee, agent, or representative of an authorizer may not simultaneously serve 5 as an employee, trustee, agent, representative, vendor, or contractor of a community choice school authorized 6 by that entity. 7 A government unit or other entity, other than those expressly granted authority under [section (8) 8 5], may not assume any authorizing function or duty in any form unless expressly allowed by law. 9 10 NEW SECTION. Section 7. Duties of commission -- oversight of authorizers. (1) (a) The 11 commission shall establish a statewide formula for authorizer funding to be applied uniformly to every 12 authorizer in the state. Authorizer funding is financed through an oversight fee. 13 The oversight fee must be calculated as a uniform percentage of the state funding allocated to (b) 14 each choice school and is to be paid from the choice school's budget share of the per-pupil funding, not to 15 exceed 3% of each community choice school's state funding in a single school year. 16 (c) The commission may establish a sliding scale for authorizer funding, with the funding 17 percentage decreasing after the authorizer has achieved a certain threshold after a certain number of years of 18 authorizing, after a certain number of schools have been authorized, or for other reasons determined at the 19 discretion of the commission. 20 (d) An authorizer's oversight fee may not include any costs incurred in delivering services that a 21 choice school may purchase at its discretion from the authorizer. The authorizer shall use the funding provided 22 under this section exclusively for the purpose of fulfilling authorizing obligations in accordance with [sections 1 23 through 17]. 24 (2) The commission is responsible for overseeing the performance and effectiveness of all 25 authorizers established under [sections 1 through 17]. 26 (3) The commission shall annually review the effectiveness of the formula it established for 27 authorizer funding and shall adjust the formula if necessary to maximize public benefit and strengthen the 28 implementation of [sections 1 through 17].



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1 (4) By October 15 of each year, the commission shall communicate to every authorizer the 2 requirements for the format, content, and submission of the annual report.

3 (5) Persistently unsatisfactory performance of an authorizer's portfolio of community choice
4 schools, a pattern of well-founded complaints about the authorizer or its choice schools, or other objective
5 circumstances may trigger a special review by the commission.

6 (6) In reviewing or evaluating the performance of authorizers, the commission shall apply7 nationally recognized principles and standards for authorizing.

8 (7) If at any time the commission finds that an authorizer is not in compliance with an existing 9 charter contract, its authorizing contract with the commission, or the requirements of authorizers under 10 [sections 1 through 17], the commission shall notify the authorizer in writing of the identified problems and shall 11 provide the authorizer reasonable opportunity to respond and remedy the problems.

12 (8) If an authorizer fails to respond and remedy the problems identified by the commission, the 13 commission shall notify the authorizer, within a reasonable amount of time under the circumstances, that it 14 intends to revoke the authorizer's authority unless the authorizer demonstrates a timely and satisfactory remedy 15 for the violation or deficiencies.

16 (9) In the event of revocation of an authorizer's authority, the commission shall manage the timely 17 and orderly transfer of each charter contract held by that authorizer to another authorizer in the state, with the 18 mutual agreement of each affected choice school and proposed new authorizer. The new authorizer shall 19 assume the existing charter contract for the remainder of the charter contract term.

20 (10) On or before December 1 of each year, beginning in the first year that choice schools have 21 been in operation for a full school year, the commission shall issue to the board of public education, the 22 education interim committee, and the public an annual report on the state's community choice schools that 23 includes data from the annual reports submitted by every authorizer, as well as any additional relevant data 24 compiled by the commission, for the school year ending in the preceding calendar year. The annual report must 25 include:

(a) a comparison of the performance of choice school students with the performance of the
 comparable grade ranges of the choice school's students' resident district schools; and

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(b) the commission's assessment of the successes, challenges, and areas for improvement in



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1 meeting the purposes of [sections 1 through 17], including the commission's assessment of the sufficiency of 2 funding for choice schools, the efficacy of the commission's formula for authorizer funding, and any suggested 3 changes in state law or policy necessary to strengthen the state's community choice schools. 4 5 NEW SECTION. Section 8. Purchase of services by choice school. (1) With the exception of 6 oversight services as required by [section 7], a community choice school may not be required to purchase 7 services from the choice school's authorizer as an express or implied condition of choice school approval or of 8 executing a charter contract. 9 A choice school may choose to purchase services from its authorizer. In that event, the choice (2)10 school and authorizer shall execute an annual service contract, separate from the charter contract, stating the 11 parties' mutual agreement concerning any services to be provided by the authorizer and any service fees to be 12 charged to the choice school. An authorizer may not charge more than market rates for services provided to a 13 choice school. 14 (3) A choice school may purchase goods and services from for-profit providers for operational and 15 ancillary purposes. 16 17 NEW SECTION. Section 9. Community choice school proposal process -- request for proposal. 18 (1) To solicit, encourage, and guide the development of choice schools, every authorizer operating under 19 [sections 1 through 17] shall issue and broadly publicize a request for proposal by June 1 of each year. The 20 content and dissemination of the request for proposal must be consistent with the purposes and requirements 21 of [sections 1 through 17]. 22 (2)Each authorizer's request for proposal must present the authorizer's strategic vision for 23 authorizing, including a clear statement of any preferences the authorizer wishes to grant to proposals that help 24 at-risk students. 25 (3)A request for proposal must include or otherwise direct applicants to the performance 26 framework that the authorizer has developed for choice school oversight and evaluation in accordance with 27 [section 7]. 28 (4) A request for proposal must include the criteria that will guide the authorizer's decision to



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1 approve or deny a choice school proposal. 2 A request for proposal must include clear and detailed questions designed to gauge an (5) 3 applicant's capacity to establish and operate a successful choice school, as well as guidelines concerning the 4 format and content of an applicant's response to the request for proposal. 5 (6) A request for proposal must require applicants to describe thoroughly the following essential 6 elements of their proposed choice school proposal: 7 (a) an executive summary; 8 (b) the mission and vision of the proposed choice school, including identification of the targeted 9 student population and the community the school hopes to serve; 10 the location or geographic area proposed for the choice school; (c) 11 (d) the grades to be served each year for the full term of the charter contract; 12 (e) minimum, planned, and maximum enrollment each year for the term of the charter contract; (f) 13 evidence of need and community support for the proposed choice school: 14 background information on the founding governing board members and, if identified, the (g) 15 proposed school leadership and management team; 16 (h) the proposed choice school's proposed calendar and sample daily schedule: 17 (i) a description of the academic program, including identification of the planned standardized 18 assessment to formally measure student achievement on an annual basis; 19 (j) a description of the proposed choice school's instructional design, including the type of learning 20 environment, class size and structure, curriculum overview, and teaching methods; 21 (k) the proposed choice school's plans for identifying and successfully serving students with 22 disabilities, students who are English language learners, students who are academically challenged, and gifted 23 students, including but not limited to compliance with applicable laws and regulations; 24 (I) a description of cocurricular or extracurricular programs, if any, and how the programs will be 25 funded and delivered; 26 (m) plans and timelines for student recruitment and enrollment, including lottery procedures: 27 the proposed choice school's student discipline policies, including those for special education (n) 28 students;



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1	(o)	an organizational chart that clearly presents the proposed choice school's organizational	
2	structure, inclu	ding lines of authority and reporting between the governing board, staff, related bodies such as	
3	advisory bodies or parent and teacher councils, and any external organizations that may play a role in

5	(p)	a clear description of the roles and responsibilities for the governing board, the proposed	
6	choice school's	s leadership and management team, and other entities shown in the organizational chart;	
7	(q)	a staffing chart for the proposed choice school's first year and a staffing plan for the term of the

9	(r)	plans for recruiting and developing school leadership and staff;	
10	(s)	the proposed choice school's leadership and teacher employment policies, including	
11	performance e	valuation plans;	
12	(t)	proposed governing bylaws;	
13	(u)	explanations of any partnerships or contractual relationships central to the proposed choice	
14	school's opera	tions or mission;	
15	(v)	the proposed choice school's plans for providing transportation, food service, and all other	
16	significant ope	rational or ancillary services, if any;	
17	(w)	opportunities and expectations for parent involvement;	
18	(x)	a detailed school startup plan identifying tasks, timelines, and responsible individuals;

26	(7)	In the case of a proposal to establish a choice school by converting an existing traditional	
27	public school to	o choice school status, a request for proposal must also require the applicants to demonstrate	
28	support for the	proposed choice school conversion by a petition signed by a majority of teachers or a majority of	



1	the local sch	ool board and a petition signed by a majority of parents of students in the existing traditional public
2	school.	
3	(8)	In the case of a proposal to establish a virtual choice school, a request for proposal must
4	additionally r	equire the applicants to describe the proposed school's system of course credits and how the
5	school will:	
6	(a)	monitor and verify full-time student enrollment, student participation in a full course load, credit
7	accrual, and	course completion;
8	(b)	monitor and verify student progress and performance in each course through regular, proctored
9	assessments	and submissions of coursework; and
10	(C)	conduct parent-teacher conferences.
11	(9)	In the case of a proposed choice school that intends to contract with an education service
12	provider for s	substantial educational services, management services, or both, a request for proposal must
13	additionally r	equire the applicants to:
14	(a)	provide evidence of the education service provider's success in serving student populations
15	similar to the	targeted population, including demonstrated academic achievement as well as successful
16	managemen	t of nonacademic school functions, if applicable;
17	(b)	provide documentation setting forth:
18	(i)	the proposed duration of the service contract;
