• 00:59:24	Leadership structures, staffing support, budget and bill options Ms. Fox asked if the committee members would like further research on having permanent staff year round in the House and Senate, one for each chamber, one for each caucus, and what that would look like. She also asked if the committee members would like more information on benefits and salaries, the budget, legislator compensation, and the IT allowance.
01:00:58	Rep. Hunter asked if anyone wanted to move forward on that idea.
01:02:35	Rep. Hansen feels that there should be some sort of permanent legislative presence that is the leadership's connection to the Capitol.
01:04:09	Sen. Essmann said he doesn't think that an addition of one person per caucus per chamber to be an assistant to the leaders would necessarily increase the legislative budget but it would offer some assistance in terms of having a more effective legislature. He encouraged further examination of it.
01:06:25	Sen. Vincent asked Ms. Fox what the base salary would be for those positions.
01:06:40	Ms. Fox discussed the costs of having different categories of that position, such as those positions are temporary, part-time, or seasonal, and look at what that package would look like. She said she would bring that information back to the Council.
01:07:33	Rep. Hunter said that as minority leader, there were times when he could have used a full time person, and other times where there wasn't a need for an assistant. If moving in this direction, he would consider having a half-time person.
• 01:08:55	Legislator compensation Rep. Hunter said that the issue of geography makes a difference in terms of how legislators conduct legislative business. He would favor a cost analysis if we went to an entry level professional position or a starting administrative position. He would like to have those numbers to look at in September.
01:10:22	Mr. Everts gave an overview of compensation in terms of calendar days versus session days.
01:14:27	Sen. Larsen said when doing constituent services, does that qualify as legislative business activities?
01:15:39	Mr. Everts said that to the extent that leadership during the session is given money for members for constituent contact, he would say yes, but up to this point in terms of constituent relations and time outside of those mailings, you haven't been reimbursed for what could be legislative business.

- 01:20:21 Ms. Fox said that she can provide information regarding stationery costs, changing the IT allowance to a communications allowance, and wrapping that into a single package so that, as a legislator, you would have a choice on what kind of communications you want.

He thinks that future legislatures could increase that discretionary appropriation or set aside a special fund or create a committee to make that decision instead of just one person.

01:41:59	Rep. Hunter started off by opening the floor to ideas that Council members might have.
01:42:37	Rep. Bennett discussed the idea of having the first three Saturdays in January off. He said he would include the 17th and the 24th for reasons that these days are not well utilized.
01:44:17	Sen. Essmann discussed the idea of having some of the Saturdays that are not immediately preceding transmittal days with one chamber in session and the other chamber not, but working on constituent contacts.
01:47:18	Rep. Bennett said that in order to maintain the overall structure of this calendar, we would need to move a few pieces around. He discussed his ideas.
01:50:59	Sen. Essmann said there would be little to no impact on the first half of the schedule. And the way this base calendar was brought to us, it wouldn't necessarily have any impact with respect to the second half of the schedule because the only deadlines that fall on this Saturday are the request deadlines. He said that Rep. Bennett's proposal does have the advantage with Day 90 still in the month of April.

Rep. Hunter said that we give the governor's office a few days to read what may potentially be a large number of bills and react to them. One day might not be

Bennett said that it sounds like there is some thought along the lines that the veto break is too long and the transmittal break is too short. He suggested the committee transition some of those days over to extend that and still keep the schedule intact. 01:57:02 Ms. Fox said that if you add one more day in the transmittal break, it might lessen the impact on per diem if you wanted to make it 4/4 or 4/3. 01:57:49 Rep. Hunter said the committee should make a decision on whether to take the first two Saturdays off entirely or just alternate between the houses. Motion Sen. Essmann moved to take alternating Saturdays off to preserve the structure 01:58:24 of the calendar and to preserve the 45 days transmittal of general bill, to add a day to the transmittal break. - O2:03:17 Rep. Bennett said the break would be the Friday, Saturday, and Sunday of April. The 15th and 16th would be legislative days as opposed to a break. He is looking on the proposed calendar provided by Ms. Fox that has "not approved by leadership, tentative" written in watermark. His proposal would be that the 17th, 18th, and 19th of April be the veto break, and the 15th and 16th as legislative days.
- 02:05:20 Sen. Essmann said Legislative Day 46 would be on March 3; Legislative Day 80 would be April 15; Legislative Day 81 would be April 16; and Legislative Day 82 would be April 17.
- 02:06:24 Mr. Everts said that from a legal standpoint, he wanted to make aware that the governor has a ten-day period in which to respond regarding vetoes.

02:12:35 Rep. Hunter gave an overview of the activities of the Electronic Communications Subcommittee meeting.

02:17:41 Rep. Hunter asked the committee if there was any interest in moving toward a uniform email address. Committee members did not express any interest.

Training proposal

- 02:18:01 Mr. Everts gave a presentation on training and said that training for staff will happen in August.
- 02:19:25 Rep. Hunter asked if the committee members wanted to go with a state email address or use their own email address.
- 02:20:45 Sen. Essmann said that this committee should look at introducing a bill draft request on this subject.
- 02:24:49 Rep. Hunter said that the Subcommittee did not get to the discussion about the use of electronic media during committees and floor sessions. He asked if the members want to reassign that to the Subcommittee for additional work.
- O2:25:21 Sen. Barrett discussed the need for rules on the use of electronic devices. She said that if the committee wanted the Subcommittee to look into that or wait, the Council could revisit it and try to write what the electronic rules would be.
- 02:26:24 Rep. Hunter said that we could task the Rules Subcommittee to consider this. He said he is seeing some nods around the table.
- O2:27:12 Rep. Hansen said that her observation is that what goes on the floor session is significantly different than what goes on in committees. Committees are the public hearings and the only place that the members of the public are entitled to be. She said that limiting technology on the floor would be counterproductive because people actually gain quite a bit of information on the floor sessions. Her concern is the public's perception of what we're doing in committee versus what's going on, on the floor.
- 02:29:53 Rep. Bennett said that there is a big difference between what happens in committee and what happens on the floor. He would be in favor of eliminating all sorts of electronic communication during committee meetings. However, on the floor, he is definitely a user of Twitter and FaceBook. It's the way that a lot of people communicate these days and that's a way that he is able to talk to the people back home about what's happening here in Helena.
- O2:31:32 Sen. Barrett said that she is concerned that during executive action, if you have your telephones and your computers on and someone else is allowed extra input during executive action, that is where we draw the line.
- O2:32:18 Sen. Vincent said that even with committee work, there are a lot of people who don't want to take notes with pen and paper so they've got their iPad out. That's what they're going to refer to when they go into executive action. It behooves the members to review their notes before they get into executive action.
- 02:33:25 Rep. Hunter said that as we talk about this, it is clear that the issues that we are more concerned about is over legislator conduct and the use of media than about the media itself. He said that he would take the prerogative of the chair

and suggest that we use the Rules Subcommittee rather than the Subcommittee on Electronic Media for guidance. He suggested that if committee members wanted to weigh in with additional comments, to send those comments electronically to the chair.
