Options A, B, and C in PD 0018: Establishing State-funded Preschool

prepared for the Education Interim Committee by Pad McCracken, Committee Staff, August 2020

The preschool bill draft, PD 0018, reflects the committee's direction from its June meeting that staff develop a bill draft establishing state-funded preschool for 4-year-olds that utilizes the school funding formula and authorizes/encourages local school district trustees to form collaborative partnerships with existing community-based providers and Head Starts. Pages 9-12 of the draft include three options (A, B, and C) for the committee to consider that show different ways in which the local collaborations could be structured and quality assured. The various elements in each option are certainly not exhaustive and can be interchanged or recombined. They are meant to be a starting point to move this conversation forward. This table may help explain their similarities and differences. The highlighting of the column headings in this table reflects the highlighting in the draft.
