**State Administering Agency MCA – Grant Functions:**

44-7-101. Functions. (1) As designated by the governor as the state planning agency under the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, as amended, the board of crime control shall perform the functions assigned to it under that act. The board shall also provide to criminal justice agencies technical assistance and supportive services that are approved by the board or assigned by the governor or legislature.

**Federal Formula Grants:** Funds are allocated to MBCC as the State Administering Agency, who is the authority for administering and distributing funds. These funds are predetermined by the federal government from authorizing legislation and regulations and based on statistical criteria for Montana. (population, size of the state crime rate, etc.)

**Federal Discretionary Grants:** These funds are awarded based on a competitive process at the federal level. These funds are applied for based on guidance and adherence to strategic goals of the MBCC. Crime Control Bureau staff keep the board apprised of these funds as they are applied for and as they are received or denied and through the duration of the award.

**State Funding:** These funds are allocated to MBCC through the legislature. These funds and programs are managed by Crime Control Bureau Staff.

1. Juvenile Detention Center Grant – General Fund
2. Domestic Violence Intervention – State Special Revenue

### **Formula Grants Explained:**

1. **Title II – Juvenile Justice** - Provide support for development and implementation of effective and coordinated prevention and intervention programs to improve the juvenile justice system to protect public safety, holds offenders accountable, and provides treatment and rehabilitative services tailored to the needs of juveniles and their families.
2. **VOCA – Victims of Crime Act** - Support the provision of service to victims of crime including responding to their emotional and physical needs, helping to stabilize their lives after a victimization, and assisting victims in understanding and participating in the criminal justice system.
3. **VAWA – Violence Against Women Act** - Assist states in the development of effective law enforcement and prosecution strategies to combat violent crimes against women and to develop and strengthen victim services in cases involving violent crimes against women.
4. **SASP – Sexual Assault Services Program** - Provides funding to assist nonprofit, nongovernmental organizations that provide core services, direct intervention, and related assistance to victims of sexual assault.
5. **JAG – Justice Assistance Grant** - Provides states and units of local governments with funding necessary to support seven program areas: 1) Law enforcement, including multi-jurisdictional drug and gang task forces; 2) Prosecution and courts, including indigent defense; 3) Prevention and education; 4) Corrections and community corrections; 5) Drug treatment and enforcement; 6) Planning, evaluation, and technology improvement; and, 7) Crime victim and witness (other than compensation).
6. **RSAT – Residential Substance Abuse Treatment** - To break the cycle of alcohol, drugs and violence by assisting state, local, and tribal efforts in reducing the demand for, use, and trafficking of illegal drugs; and reducing the number of repeat DUI offenders through the provision of alternative, community-based treatment, thereby increasing both offender productivity and public safety.
7. **Paul Coverdell** – Improve the quality and timeliness of forensic science and medical examiner services. May be used to eliminate a backlog in the analysis of forensic evidence and to train and employ forensic laboratory personnel, as needed, to eliminate such a backlog.

### **Discretionary Grants Explained:**

1. **JMHCP – Justice and Mental Health Collaboration Program** - Supports innovative cross-system collaboration to improve responses and outcomes for individuals with mental illnesses or co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders who encounter the justice system.
2. **SAC – Statistical Analysis Center** – Provide support to state SAC's to operate, collect, analyze, and report statistics on crime and justice to federal, state, and local levels of government and to share state-level information nationally.
3. **NCHIP – National Criminal History Improvement Program** - Enhance criminal justice capabilities of state governments by improving the accuracy, utility, and interstate accessibility of criminal history records and enhancing records of protective orders involving domestic violence and stalking, sex offender records, automated identification systems and other state systems supporting national records systems and their use for criminal history background checks.
4. **SAKI – Sexual Assault Kit Initiative** - Address the growing number of unsubmitted Sexual Assault Kits in law enforcement custody, and to help provide resolution for victims when possible.
5. **PSN – Project Safe Neighborhoods** - Nationwide initiative that brings together federal, state, local and tribal law enforcement officials, prosecutors, and community leaders to identify the most pressing violent crime problems in a community and develop comprehensive solutions to address them.
6. **COAP – Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Program** - Focuses on systemwide initiatives, as well as innovative approaches, to promote substance abuse treatment and recovery support. These concepts are rooted in the Sequential Intercept Model. The model provides a conceptual framework that communities can use when considering the interface between the criminal justice and substance abuse treatment systems.
7. **Abuse in Later Life Program** - Addresses elder abuse, neglect, and exploitation, including domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking, against victims who are 50 years of age or older through training and services.
8. **LSOC - Linking Systems of Care** - Implementing consistent screening for childhood through young adults exposure to crime as a victim and working with a diverse range of communities to link children and youth to services. Their work encompasses urban and rural areas of the state, and they work closely with Tribal and non-Tribal partners

### **State Funds Explained:**

1. **Juvenile Detention Center Grant** – Provide State General Fund allocation to help counties sustain regional core juvenile detention capacity and provide incentive to use alternatives to detention.
2. **Domestic Violence Intervention** – Funding for Misdemeanor Probation is to provide monitoring and enforcement of sentence compliance for offenders who have been convicted of first or second offense Partner or Family Member Assault (PFMA) under MCA 45-5-206 or of a violation of an order of protection under MCA 45-5-626.



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## Montana Board of Crime Control - Statistical Analysis Center (SAC)

### History

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SACs were established in 1968 in a section under the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act and Montana produced the first Crime in Montana Report in 1972. In 1979, the FBI Bureau of Justice Statistics assumed the SAC program from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration. SACs were created to collect, analyze, and report statistics on crime and justice to Federal, state, and local levels of government, and to share state-level information nationally. The Montana SAC was created in 1991 by Executive Order from Governor Stan Stephens and was designated to be housed within the Board of Crime Control. The information produced by SACs is critical to local, state, and Federal criminal justice agencies and community organizations as they develop programs and policies related to crime, illegal drugs, victim services, and the administration of justice. The crime information produced is also used to allocate funds to a variety of formula grants such as Justice Assistance Grants (JAG).

### National Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Data Collection

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The Montana SAC collects the crime data for the FBI and began the more detailed data collect known as National Incident-Based Crime Reporting System (NIBRS) and Montana Incident-Based Reporting System (MTIBRS) in 1999. NIBRS/MTIBRS contains:

- **Incident:** The incident contains all data related to the call for service or the 911 call.
- **Offense:** An incident may contain more than one offense, for example burglary, vandalism and simple assault. The offense information includes details about the offense such as location of the crime, weapons used, bias motivation, and other relevant offense specific data.
- **Property:** Information about the type, value, and (for drugs and narcotics seized in drug cases) quantity of property involved in the incident.
- **Victim and Offender:** Demographic information about the victims and offenders involved in the incident such as age, sex, race, and ethnicity.
- **Arrest:** Arrest information is often collected after the initial incident report. This information is used to verify when an incident is closed and turned over to the courts for prosecution.

### Continued National Leadership Through Data Expansion

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NIBRS does not contain any personally identifiable information and is primarily used to spotlight crime trends. After 47 years of being at the forefront nationally for data for quantity and quality, Montana was received funding to bring MTIBRS to the most current FBI Technical Specifications. These funds will help us maintain our leadership role as the remaining 39 states and territories move to NIBRS within the next three years. Some of the fields and features to be added with these funds will be:


- Latitude and longitude for heat mapping of high crime areas

- Improving the reliability of a variety of indicators such as suspected use of drugs or alcohol, mental health related, drug related offense, and victim notification.
- Realtime submission of data to the state, FBI and victim notification system.
- Quality assurance features.
- Timelier and easily digestible public access to crime data and trends through interactive dashboards.

### **SAC Grant Management - \$11-Million and growing since 2011**

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Several grant opportunities are designated towards SACs to better direct funds related to criminal justice activities. Montana has received over \$8-million in competitive funds alone since 2015. Because of previously funded projects, Montana has declined to seek additional funds until the current projects have been completed.





### **Evidence based Practice and Data Driven Decision Making**



### Block Grants Awarded to MBCC and Subawarded by Year







### Grant Funds by Region




### Grant Funds by Region




# Montana Board of Crime Control Grant Regions


