

One of the challenges of doing community organizing for voter turn-out is the contraction of timely, publically available information about satellite offices and election results in Montana. There was significantly more election information available within days of elections under Secretary of State, Linda McCulloch.

The table below was compiled from information on registered voters and absentee voting on the Secretary of State's 'Election Services' web page. For some counties, these numbers differ from those offered by county election officials this morning – which is, in itself, a problem. According to the Secretary of State's website, eight of the nine counties with the lowest turnout contained Reservation lands within their boundaries. Under previous Secretaries of State, we would be able to analyze results to compare precincts located on Reservations with those outside.

Montana Counties with the lowest effective turn-out in the Montana 2020 Primary.



These results show that significant barriers to American Indian participation in elections in Montana remain. Our assumption is that a precinct-level analysis would further demonstrate this disparity.

One of the barriers to participation is information. The Secretary of State, and some of the counties did not include information on satellite election office locations until late in the period for absentee voting. Voting required not only equal access to the physical act of voting, but also equal access to information about how and when to vote. While the Secretary of State and some of the counties are not violating the letter of the law as laid out in the terms of the Wandering Medicine settlement, they are violating the spirit of the settlement.

The next page shows a screen shot of the Election Results as shown on the Secretary of State's website. The technology should make the cost of providing information cheaper than under previous administrations. This lack of timely election information is a concern for Indian

People's Action as it directly impacts the ability of small grassroots organizations to effectively target resources in assisting our communities.
