At your January 13-14, 2022, meeting, the committee directed me to work with Senators Webber and Fox on a provisional bill draft addressing the "decennial study" of the economic contributions of the tribes to Montana's economy. This has been a topic of conversation throughout the interim, and in January you were presented with this <u>background memo</u> I prepared and <u>these slides</u> from Office of Indian Country Economic Development at the Department of Commerce. There seem to be persistent questions about exactly what the Legislature wanted from the report, the timeline, and the adequacy of the funding provided by the 2019 Legislature—\$48,000.

Senators Webber and Fox and I have met with Director of Indian Affairs Misty Kuhl and Maria Valandra and Liane Taylor from the Department of Commerce twice via Zoom since January.

We will walk through the attached table which provides a concise overview of the issues this informal working group has identified and some options for STRC as a whole to consider as the working group continues its work. While we have developed some preliminary bill drafts reflecting the two options on the table, it seemed more productive to hold off for now on bringing the drafts to the full committee.

The working group is leaning towards recommending the component of option #2 that replaces the existing requirement that Commerce publish a decennial report with a requirement that Commerce develop a system to collect and publish data on the economic contributions of Indian Country on an ongoing basis. Here is the draft language in its current form:

[The department of commerce shall...] in collaboration with the state-tribal economic development commission and tribal governments, develop a system for gathering financial data allowing the department to quantify on an ongoing basis the economic contributions of Indian reservations in Montana and the Little Shell Chippewa tribe based on federal, state, local, tribal, and private inputs. The department shall, beginning no later than December 1, 2024, and in a manner beneficial to tribal governments,

#### Other Background

This is not a comprehensive timeline of legislation related to Indian Country Economic Development, but it may offer some insight into the way things have evolved over time.

1999 – <u>HB 670 (Eggers)</u> "The Native American Economic Development Act of 1999"

- Created STED; attached to the Governor's Office
- Required STED to conduct a comprehensive assessment of reservations economic conditions (the first two YellowRobe reports were done as part of this)
- Required the Governor's Director of Indian Affairs to report at every STRC meeting on the actions of STED
- Required the Governor's Director of Indian Affairs to hire a "federal grants coordinator" and a "tribal business center coordinator" (these positions were apparently never funded or hired)
- Created state and federal special revenue accounts for STED and transferred and appropriated \$200,000 into the state account
- Required Commerce to assist STED

#### 2005 – <u>HJ 41</u> (Campbell)

 An interim study resolution on Indian Country economic development; the 2005-2006 STRC reported on this (see chapter four of its <u>final report</u>)

### 2005 – <u>HB 2</u>

 The origins of the Indian Country Economic Development (ICED) grant programs administered by STED appear to be in a \$500,000/year OTO appropriation to Commerce; the appropriation was not accompanied by any legislation describing the program and was intended to be designed and implemented by Commerce in consultation with STED

2007 – <u>SB 173</u> (Juneau):

- Moved STED to Commerce
- Repealed termination dates for STED

2017 – <u>SB 309</u> (Whitford):

• Carved out a small slice of the "bed tax" for STED to utilize for activities in the Indian tourism region; this money goes to STED's state special revenue account

2019 – <u>HB 632</u> (Bahr):

• Established the decennial report assigned to Commerce (and BBER) and appropriated \$48,000 to Commerce to pay for the costs of the report
