Post-final decree system of judicial administration of water rights

### **Comment:**

I live on the lower Teton River and have been actively involved in all of the organizations that were established to facilitate representation for the recent adjudication, such as Lower Teton Water Users and Lower Teton River Improvement District. We spent 10 years, thousands of man-hours and hundreds of thousands of dollars to work through the adjudication and memorialize our senior rights on the Teton. With the conclusion of the adjudication several years ago, we shifted to the administration of the river, and established a system that has worked well over the past 4 years. The system has a Chief Water Commissioner and a number of zonal water commissioners. The Teton River basin is complex. Lower users have spent decades analyzing and assessing the system, first as part of the adjudication process and then as part of the administration. The basin's commissioners are generally also very familiar with the system because of their involvement in agriculture or in the administration of water rights in the basin. These commissioners understand the system and have awareness of the DNRC's extensive work on the Teton River Basin, which has allowed them to administer water in a way that accomplishes the goal of fair administration based on the priority system. The Lower Teton Water Users (which represents 25 downstream users) concerns can be summed up in an old adage: "If it ain't broke, don't fix it." The current system, while not perfect, has worked well in some very challenging years, including 2022. Our concern is that if administration is taken away from local commissioners then we would lose those decades of understanding of the system and start from square one with educating a whole new group who may not have the local knowledge required.
