

Setting the Foundation for Workgroup Improvements to Community Supervision

This brief summarizes some of the findings MT's Effective Supervision and Conditions Workgroups have considered that inform their goals and objectives.

Effective Supervision Workgroup

Purpose: Provide guidance on how P&P officers can better respond to individualized behavior-change needs through proactive case plans, case distribution, and meaningful contacts with supervisees.



Conditions Workgroup

Purpose: Address options for streamlining the condition-setting process and individualizing conditions in a manner that advances public safety and rehabilitation, thereby reducing barriers to success.

Factors Informing the Effective Supervision Workgroup

Revoked individuals often experience:

- Housing Instability
 2x more likely than people who successfully complete supervision
- Substance Use Challenges
 98% of people revoked
- Mental Health Challenges
 61% of people revoked
- Unemployment78% of people revoked

Revocations are occurring relatively early in the supervision period, making the first year of supervision the most critical.




Peaks in Revocation Rates




Revocation rates were much higher for those assessed as high risk.

Probation 18% of those assessed as low risk were revoked 94% of those assessed as very high risk were revoked



Factors Informing the Conditions Workgroup

Condition Setting and Revocations:



- The median number of probation conditions among those ultimately revoked increased nearly 30% from 2012 to 2019.
- Between standard, statutory, and specialized conditions, an individual on supervision may be ordered to comply with up to 40 different conditions, more than double the national average of 17.

Practitioner listening sessions revealed the following key takeaways about the **purpose** of supervision conditions:

Judges:

Conditions are used to deter criminal behavior and support accountability.

Public Defenders:

Conditions are used to support an individual's rehabilitation and reentry.

County Attorneys:

Conditions are used to hold individuals accountable and promote public safety.

Next Steps:

Workgroups will continue to meet in 2024 and bring recommendations to DOC and other stakeholders.
