

### Licensed Providers-November 2023



- •Center an out-of-home place in which care is provided to <u>16 or</u> more children.
- •**Group home -** a private residence or other structure in which care is provided for <u>9 to 15 children.</u>
- •Family Home a private residence in which care is provided for <u>3-8</u> children.
- •Family, Friend, Neighbor Provider a provider which may provide care in a child's home or in the provider's residence for a sibling group of any size or no more than <u>4 unrelated children</u>.
- •Relative Care Exempt Provider a provider that may care for either a sibling group of any size or no more than 2 children from separate households. This provider type is considered 'License Exempt'.

# Staffing Child Care-November 2023

- 950 Total licensed programs, all types
- 5,162 Total current approved staff, all types
- 439 Average number of new staff entering the industry since last year.



# Best Beginnings Child Care Scholarship

#### **Benefits to Families**

- Available to families who:
  - Are working or going to school,
  - Make 185% FPL or less, and
  - Need child care.
- Each family participates in the cost of care through a copayment.
  - \$10 copayment ended December 2022 back to sliding scale.
  - HB 648 now caps at 9%
- Authorized for a full year.

#### **Benefits to Child Care Providers**

- Reimbursement rates are set at the 75<sup>th</sup> percentile of the market rate.
- Payments are made directly to providers. Online invoicing available.
- Full-authorized amounts are paid.

- Provider reimbursement rates are set based on a valid and reliable Market Rate Survey conducted every 3 years.

Key Goals for COVID-19 Child Care Funding

Stabilize the sector

Increase wages/benefits

Increase payment rates

Address workforce shortage

Improve payment policies

Build the supply of child care

Expand access



# CARES, ARPA, and CRSSA Cont.

- CARES: The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act went to support Montanans impacted by COVID-19. Grant funds covered closures or absences for up to two weeks per month at 100% of the authorized amount at licensed and registered child care programs. Financial supports were also given to families to assist with copayments.
- CRRSA: The Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act awarded Montana to help. Grants were used to increase income eligibility from 150 to 185 of the Federal poverty level, reduce copays for all families to \$10/month, and to pay providers based on a child's enrollment status rather than their attendance.
- ARPA: The American Rescue Plan Act awarded Montana \$110 million to help stabilize the child care industry. Grants to providers helped offset operating expenses and other loses during the pandemic. Currently, the funding is being used to expand the State's child care infrastructure and provide monetary supports for child care workers and other essential workers.



### **ARPA Stabilization Grants**

Stabilization Grants: Licensed child care providers applied for funding to stabilize their child care businesses by maintaining or resuming child care services.

- Of the over 900 licensed child care providers in the state during the grant application period, there were 709 who applied and were grant eligible.
- \$62 million awarded total
- 5<sup>th</sup> Quarter payments with additional priority for child care deserts.





# ARPA Funding -Stabilization Grants

Range of Stabilization Grant amounts including 5<sup>th</sup> quarter and child care desert payment awards.

# ARPA Supplemental Funding

# ARPA Funding - Business Supports



- Shared Services

# ARPA Funding - Workforce Incentives

# \$4 million in one-time-only funds for child care workforce retention and incentive payments.

- Round 1 payments of \$600.
- Round 2 payments of \$1,000.
- 3,711 child care staff received funds.

#### Eligible child care professionals were:

- Active on the ECP Workforce Registry and working at a program approved by Montana Child Care Licensing in one of the following positions:
  - Early Childhood Teacher (Full and Part Time)
  - Early Childhood Assistant Teacher (Full and Part Time)
  - School Age Teacher (Full and Part Time)
  - Director



# ARPA Funding - Montana Dept of Labor & Industry

- A MOU, signed March of 2022, established a Child Care Business Development Specialist position at DLI and directed \$288,000 of ARPA funds to:
  - Collaborate with DLI Workforce Services to create and monitor child care workforce stabilization and expansion goals
  - Develop or enhance career pathways

#### Current Outcomes

- Developed a 3-tier career pathway aligned to national standards
  - Level 1 Pre-apprenticeship (CDA)
  - Level 2 Apprenticeship (associate degree)
  - Level 3 Bachelor's or master's degree
- Launched a Pre-apprenticeship pilot
  - Developed CDA course work
- Developed new framework for mentor qualifications



# ARPA Funding-Health Care Workers

 Provided \$2 million in child care assistance to certain workers in the health care field.

This program served 341 children in 211 families.

- Child Care Worker Program started on 10/01/2023
- Contract with P-5 Fiscal Strategies to conduct a cost of quality care analysis of the early childhood system
  - In partnership with Zero to Five's evaluation of the cost of quality child care in Montana

- Workforce Research/Evaluation Project will direct future workforce strategies
- Child Care Recruitment and Retention Mini-grants
  - Support the development and implementation of providerdriven approaches to recruit and retain staff
  - Evaluate best practices to guide future initiative
