REQUIRED ACTION

Implementation: Complete nonenforcement firearms policy that is currently in draft. Recommend it get reviewed one more time by all affected divisions and biologist union. Complete inventory of nonenforcement staff that require firearms to perform their job (may include Fisheries, Hatcheries, Wildlife, POR), and an inventory of firearms currently in possession or needed. Statute allows employees to be issued a firearm only after submitting a form of final approval as determined and approved by the department. That form needs to be developed, distributed, and approval requirements implemented. Enforcement will develop a qualification training for each firearm type (handgun, shotgun, rifle) and will conduct at least one qualification per region per year. Develop record-keeping system to track which employees are authorized to carry and use firearms in the course of their position, what firearms they are issued, and dates qualification was completed for each firearm type. Keep all of this up to date as staff turns over and changes.

Because many nonenforcement staff already have department purchased firearms and are using them in the course of their jobs, and because this bill has an immediate effective date, implementation steps as described above should happen immediately.

Rulemaking: None needed, although rule making authority is included in the title of the bill and in statute.

REQUIRED ACTION

Implementation: FWP will need to: 1) change documentation to accommodate changes to the program title and any references to the program sunset, including on the program web page, downloadable documents, web grant site, and other outreach resources; 2) inform the council of legislated changes and seek their recommendations on other treatment options potentially funded through the program to reduce noxious weeds and support native vegetation; 3) adjust budget templates in the web grant system to accommodate administrative costs, and 4) decide under what circumstances, if any, current grants could be amended to allow for the addition of administration costs, if grantees make such a request, and proceed accordingly.

<u>Rulemaking</u>: May need to adjust ARM 12.9.1602 which lists eligible expenditures. As currently written, the rule does not include administration costs nor other "weed and soil treatment options and methods recommended by the council..."

The winter trail pass replaced the previous Snowmobile Trail Pass for residents and the Temporary Use Snowmobile Permit for nonresidents. References to those former items should've been removed from all statutes as part of SB 38, but they were missed in 23-2-614. HB 99 corrects those omissions and clears up confusion for people wondering if the permit was still required for nonresidents to operate a snowmobile anywhere in Montana. It is not. Only the winter trail pass is now needed, and it's only required for operation on trails groomed with funds from FWP.

<u>Implementation</u>: Already implemented after SB 38 in 2021. However, we misbranded the nonresident winter trail pass in 2022 and need to correctly identify what nonresidents purchase as the nonresident winter trail pass in 2023 and beyond.

Currently, 20 state parks take reservations for the peak season (May-September) and 10 of these parks meet bill requirements of no more than 80% of reservable campsites. Therefore, the remaining 10 locations will require adjustments in the reservation system by reducing the number of reservable sites below 80%. At this point in time, there are no reservable fishing access sites or wildlife management areas that will be impacted. Section 3 of the bill outlines that HB 440 doesn't apply to a river system where camping opportunity is limited to designated float-in sites (I.e., Blackfoot Corridor, Smith River).

REQUIRED ACTION

<u>Implementation</u>: Staff will be immediately notified of this legislation in order to implement this operational change by October 1st, 2023. Parks and Recreation staff will need to change the reservable information on the campsite posts at the affected parks. Parks currently have a one-day minimum reservation window. Sites not reserved are available as a walk-in for that one night. If staff are present, they can register the visitor for more than one night if the site is open (no reservation coming in). An alert regarding the change will need to be set up on the landing pages for reservations and FWP website notifying the affected public. Staff will communicate this change with key partner groups for expanded awareness.

 the complimentary license or permit by defining "employee" and "immediate family member."
 "Employee" means a person who works full time for the landowner as part of an active farm or
 ranch operation enrolled in the program. "Immediate family member" means a spouse, parent,
 grandparent, child, grandchild, sibling, niece, or nephew by blood, marriage, or legal adoption."

BILL SYNOPSIS

Requires FWP to manage grizzly bears at a level to maintain their delisted status, which for the GYE and NCDE would be within agreed upon mortality thresholds and within distribution and occupancy requirements as described in respective conservation strategies.

Makes clear that mortalities from all sources, including take by livestock owners and translocations out of the delisted population would count against agreed upon mortality thresholds.

Makes clear that preventative and nonlethal measures are expected part of management.

Requires the commission to adopt rules to allow a livestock owner to take a bear that is attacking or killing livestock and lists minimum items that must be included in the rules including establishing a quota for the number of bears that may be taken under this provision.

Provides that the Director or his/her designee may issue take permits to livestock producers whose livestock are threatened by a grizzly bear. Those would also be subject to the quota established by the Commission and subject to mortality thresholds.

Requires the department to the greatest extent possible, to prioritize genetic exchange between ecosystems when capturing and translocating a grizzly bear.

Also included an appropriation in HB2 for implementation including 2 FTE. Wording in the appropriation was for grizzly bear management but primary intent is for genetic exchange.

REQUIRED ACTION

Implementation: Requires rule making by the Commission prior to delisting, which would be September

2024 at the earliest. The rule should contain a process for establishing annual quotas for take by livestock

producers.

Define roles and responsibilities of the FTE that was appropriated for this bill, produce job description,

and initiate hiring process with intent of hiring by July 2023.

Complete procurement process for traps that are dedicated to the genetic exchange effort.

Work with and obtain permission from Wyoming for translocation of bears from NCDE to GYE as early as

Summer 2023. Follow adopted protocol for movement of bears for genetic exchange.

Work with USFWS on approval to move a bear from NCDE to GYE.

Provide direction to NCDE monitoring team to make available a bear that meets the protocol

requirements for genetic exchange, assuming a place to move it is approved.

Rulemaking: Prior to delisting, develop rules as required by this bill and containing at least the provisions

required by the statute in subsection 3: The rules adopted by the commission must:

(a) be consistent with the most recent state of Montana grizzly bear management plan, conservation

strategies, including mortality thresholds, and the adaptive management principles of the commission

and the department for the grizzly bear population;

(b) require a livestock owner or other authorized person who takes a grizzly bear pursuant to this

subsection (3) to promptly report the taking of the grizzly bear to the department within 24 hours and to

preserve the carcass of the grizzly bear;

(c) establish a quota each year for the total number of grizzly bears that may be taken pursuant to
