









The Care Campus underwent a transformation from its previous identity as the National American University college campus. Pennington County acquired the property in October 2015 with the vision of repurposing it to serve the community's needs. On September 26, 2018, the Care Campus officially opened its doors. The facility spans an impressive 70,000 square feet, and an additional 14,000 square feet across the alley, designated for Pivot Point, which recently opened. The Care Campus is a collaborative effort involving four key partners: the Pennington County Sheriff's Office, Pennington County Human Services, Behavior Management Systems, and the Rapid City Police Department. Pennington County has invested \$14.1 million dollars and was the recipient of a private donation for \$2.2 million to complete the 64-bed residential treatment which opened in 2019. \$900,000 was provided from the City of Rapid City and costs are split between the City of Rapid City and Pennington County. The John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation provided funding for additional staff within the Care Campus to facilitate alternatives to incarceration and Monument Health provided a donation for staffing assistance.

Programs on the campus include Detox, Safe Solutions, Pennington County Human Services, Rapid City Police Department Quality of Life Unit, Outpatient Treatment, Residential Treatment and Pivot Point (Assessment Center/Crisis Stabilization Unit). Collaboration occurs with multiple partners and programs to collectively pursue the common objective of delivering timely and suitable services to meet the needs of our community members. Individuals seeking assistance engage with the Care Campus programs through a centralized intake area. The campus has emerged as a crucial resource, evident by over 100,000 admissions. Programs on the campus address the diverse and complex needs of individuals within our community.

The Care Campus serves as an effective system diversion tool for law enforcement agencies, providing a centralized campus where individuals obtain necessary services. This streamlined approach significantly reduces the need for transporting individuals to higher levels of care, such as emergency rooms or the Pennington County Jail, by offering a comprehensive range of services within one facility. The campus minimizes the burden on law enforcement officers, and they complete the intake process within 3 to 5 minutes. This efficient process allows officers to quickly return to their patrol duties, ensuring the effective utilization of law enforcement resources and maintaining public safety in a timely manner.

Detox- 28 Male Beds/16 Female Beds

 Provides 24/7 monitoring and withdrawal management services while detoxing for up to 5 days. Counselors can identify treatment options and make referrals.

Safe Solutions-30 Male Beds/16 Female Beds

- Harm Reduction Model providing a providing a safe place to sleep for individuals who are intoxicated.
- Attempt to connect people with services that help facilitate sobriety.

Isolation Units-3 Male/3 Female

o Residential Treatment-32 Male Beds/32 Female Beds

o 64 Residential Treatment Beds (Methamphetamine, opioids, alcohol and heroin).

Outpatient Treatment

- Intensive Methamphetamine Treatment/MRT (Moral Recognition Therapy)/CBISA (Cognitive Behavioral Interventions for Substance Abuse)
- o IOP (Intensive Outpatient Services)/ ICIP (Intermediate Correctional Intervention Program)
- After Care

o Pennington County Human Services

o Transitional Coordination (Safe Solutions, Crisis Care Center, Rebound Reentry Program), economic assistance (rent, utilities), transitional housing assistance, veterans' services, medical and medication assistance.

Pivot Point (Assessment Center and Crisis Stabilization Unit) 16 Beds for Males/Females and 8 Medical Recliners

 Managed by Behavior Management Systems, Pivot Point operates 24/7 serving acute behavioral needs allowing clients to stay up to 5 days, serving 11 counties in Western South Dakota. Primary objectives include establishing vital service connections for individuals and providing transitional coordination services until a sustainable, long-term solution is established.

o Rapid City Police Department Quality of Life Unit

 Proactively engage the most vulnerable to prevent victimization and reduce crime. Partnering with other Social Services stakeholders and the Criminal Justice System.
