	<p>MIT Election Data + Science Lab (MEDSL)</p> <p>MEDSL is a nonpartisan research organization supporting advances in election science by collecting, analyzing, and sharing core data and findings. They aim to build relationships with election officials and others to help apply new scientific research to the practice of democracy in the United States.</p>
	<p>Bipartisan Policy Center</p> <p>BPC is a non-partisan non-profit organization that researches and provides reports on evidence-based and data-driven reforms for many policy areas including elections. While BPC has largely focused on policy at the federal level, their Elections Project looks at the state level.</p>
	<p>Elections and Voting Information Center (EVIC)</p> <p>The Elections & Voting Information Center (EVIC) is a non-partisan academic research center researching non-partisan solutions to identified problems in election administration backed by empirical evidence.</p>
	<p>The National Association of Election Officials (The Election Center)</p> <p>NAEO is a professional organization for election officials providing updates regarding legislation, regulations, court decisions, and Justice Department rulings which affect elections administration. They perform research for officials concerning state or local laws, regulations, or practices with elections administration.</p>
	<p>The National Association of State Election Directors</p> <p>NASED is a professional organization for state election directors in the U.S. NASED facilitates information sharing across the states and territories and helps the federal government share information with state and territorial election officials to understand the complexities of election administration.</p>
	<p>U.S. Election Assistance Commission</p> <p>The U.S. Election Assistance Commission (EAC) is an independent, bipartisan federal commission that serves as the nation's clearinghouse of information on election administration.</p>

	<p>The National Association of Secretaries of State</p> <p>NASS is a professional organization for secretaries of state in the U.S. NASS serves as a medium for the exchange of information between states and fosters cooperation in the development of public policy with key initiatives in elections and voting.</p>
	<p>The Elections Group</p> <p>The Elections Group is a non-partisan group of former election officials that develop resources and solutions supporting election officials. They partner with state and local election jurisdictions, and nonprofit organizations who are looking to implement new programs or improve processes for voters and stakeholders.</p>
	<p>William & Mary Election Law Program</p> <p>The Election Law Program seeks to provide practical assistance to judges called upon to resolve difficult election law disputes. The Program's Election Law Manual provides a comprehensive overview of election law topics and judicial relief available.</p>
