The new information is not the best. The large map that shows up first thing, taking up most of the screen, is totally irrelevant,. It does not show anything other than possibly the belief that all places of use are a square or rectangle. If the map were to show the place of use as mapped by the claimants, and submitted, that would be nice. The old system allowed you to click on a map, if you wanted to look at one. That was rarely the case. The map should not be the majority of the screen. In order to get to the information you need on a specifc water right, you have to scroll, and scroll, and scroll from left to right. Usually, if you hit it wrong, the whole deal races way past what the place you need to be, so you have to scroll back and back and back. Opening an abstract takes on average 1 minute and 45 seconds. The one thing that works fairly well is the documents do open up fairly quickly. The ability to download a report is nice, however, once down loaded you cannot sort by date due to different date formats ie: 01/01/1902 or 1883/01/01, and you cannot change the format in the downloaded version. The search criteria should be separate, not on the same page as the map, if it absolutely has to be there and the findings.
