Montana Districting and Apportionment Commission Comments received between midnight on November 8 and 10 a.m. on November 11

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments on the new proposed maps for our Congressional districts.

I support Map #11 for the following reasons:

• This plan closely follows the historical precedent of the 1980s Congressional districts, moving only two counties to reach perfect population equality.

• As has always been the case when Montana had two congressional districts, the deep economic connection between Livingston and Bozeman is respected under Proposal 11, ensuring district lines don't divide the flows of workers, innovation, and dollars between the two communities.

• This map keeps Jefferson and Broadwater counties together with Helena, making sure that most commuters are kept in the same district as their workplace.

• This map keeps the union towns of Helena and Butte together, as every redistricting plan in Montana has previously done.

• This map keeps all of the Rocky Mountain Front, Golden Triangle, and Hi Line intact, where agriculture remains such a vital part of the local economy. Rural interests are an important part of Montana's diversity and heritage that should be kept together for a stronger voice in Congress.

• Native voters are empowered under this plan, as there is a competitive district with a reservation, meaning that every candidate has to rely on Native votes to win the district. Non-competitive districts don't elevate voices and ensure accountability in the same way.

•Areas that heavily rely on ski tourism to support the local economy are kept in one district, forcing a Congressperson to pay attention to the needs of areas that use the winter outdoor recreation to drive economic growth.

I oppose Map #10 for the following reasons:

• This plan breaks with the Historical precedent in Montana by separating the towns of Helena and Butte, diluting union strength and breaking apart a community of interest that's existed for over a century.

• This plan creates two Republican districts, which unduly favors one party. With two congressional districts now instead of one, a fair map includes one competitive district that either party can win.

• This plan dilutes the power of Montana farmers and ranchers by breaking up the Golden Triangle and critical grain and cattle producing regions in Montana. This is cracking the farm and ranch vote pure and simple.

• This plan separates commuters that live in Jefferson county from the place where so many of them work in Helena. This is clearly breaking apart a community of interest.

• This plan splits the towns of Big Sky and Gallatin Gateway even though there is no clear reason to do so since Gallatin county could have been split in such a way to keep them together. This is a partisan cut of Gallatin County designed to crack apart Democratic votes and splitting two small towns for no reason violates your criteria on minimizing the unnecessary division of towns.

• This plan separates Park and Gallatin County from one another, cutting apart an area with vital economic connections and shared interests. Plan 11 better acknowledges this community of interest.

Madam Chair and Members of the Commission -

I feel compelled to make my voice heard regarding the redistricting process after hearing some comments this morning from both one of the members of the Legislature and a member of this own Commission. I'm a newcomer to Montana. My wife and I moved here earlier this year, and we are proud and happy to be here. We don't live in a million-dollar home in Paradise Valley or the Flathead, we live in a working class community in the Helena area. Of course, I recognize that we, as newcomers, are part of the reason that Montana is in the position of earning a second Congressional seat - doubling our representation in the U.S. House - but also making your job more difficult.

From the outset, it has been clear that the Chair led this Commission with professionalism and fairness as cornerstones of her approach. It's also equally clear that one side of the Commission worked toward compromise throughout the process, and to put their efforts behind prioritizing the statutory obligations of this Commission versus prioritizing the discretionary goals that the other side attempted to make the primary mission of their efforts in order to, in essence, gerrymander one of the two districts to their partisan favor.

Today, you are faced with a choice - proceed with the compromise map of CP12 after a lengthy, thorough, constructive, and engaging process, or scuttle this progress in the name of vaguely defined competitiveness because one side isn't confident in their ability to win elections. I urge you to stay the course and pass map CP12 as is.

The Chair recently commented that "with the right person, you could have a competitive district." Candidates matter. As we just saw in Virginia, Republican Glenn Youngkin will soon be governor because he appealed to the constituencies necessary to win election in a state that has been trending consistently blue in recent years. Even looking at Congressional district-level data, he earned more votes in places where Democrats are currently elected to Congress.

Additionally, as was pointed out in a recent AP story on the Commission, "the chosen map is very similar to the one used the last time Montana had two congressional districts." As we've seen, population growth has been strongest in Western Montana. This trend will likely continue. With Democratic strongholds like Bozeman, Missoula, and Butte remaining in the western district, as they were previously, Democrats - with a quality candidate who can appeal to the majority of Montanans - have just as good a shot to win a Congressional race as anywhere else, if they invest in quality candidates and promote an agenda that appeals to

Montanans.

Map CP12 is a reasonable map that is the result of true compromise. It does not disenfranchise anyone, despite the hysterics of some. It does not "unduly favor" any one party. It is based in reality. It contains multiple Tribal Nations within the borders of each district. It keeps as many communities of interest intact as possible. It splits only a single county, and does so with the expressed support of members of those communities. And most importantly, above all, it is Constitutional. CP12 should be the map to guide our Congressional districts for the next decade.

Thank you for your difficult work on behalf of Montanans.

Dear Commissioners,

I would like to bring your attention to the following examples about gerrymandering. I would like to point out that both maps 2 and 3 are gerrymandered. Even though map 2 has perfect rectangles, it is still gerrymandered to favor the current, majority party. The fairest, most equitable map is map 1 where the like minded "residents" /colors are grouped together. By grouping the most like minded residents together residents have a better chance of electing officials that actually represent them.

I would like to remind you that this process for drawing districts was meant to be fair and draw competitive districts and not favor one party, even if one party is currently in the majority.



Three examples of how to divide 50 people into 5 districts

Let's say there is a town with 50 residents and five seats on the town council. Each district should have 10 people so that each elected official represents the same number of people—this is the concept of "one person, one vote." Of the 50 town residents, 60 percent are members of the blue party and 40 percent are members of the orange party. In a fair system, they should be able to compete for and win representation for their different views on the town council. But that depends on how the districts within the town are drawn. These maps show how districts can be drawn to facilitate equitable results or to favor one party.




50 people total: 60% 40%

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Map that is not compact or fair = 2 districts = 3 districts



In Map 2, if each of the five districts is drawn to have 60 percent blue and 40 percent orange supporters, then blue candidates are likely to win every election, leading to a council with 100 percent blue representatives and no one representing the orange view.

In Map 3, the districts have been drawn so that even though the town as a whole has a majority of blue party supporters, the blue supporters have been packed into a supermajority of fewer districts. The overall smaller number of orange supporters have been spread out to form a majority in a greater number of districts, which allows them to capture a majority of the town council with fewer supporters in the town.

I still tune in to Fox News, and yesterday, Nov 9, Molly Hemingway had it right when she called the Republicans out for not doing what they should do. This is why I still watch Fox. Chair Smith and Commissioners:

Thank you for your service to the State of Montana on the Districting and Apportionment Commission. Your job is an important one and we are encouraged by the work accomplished to date. Please accept this letter of comment from the Urban Counties Coalition of the Montana Association of Counties.

As you became familiar with your roles and responsibilities on the Commission you've been repeatedly directed to the provisions of Title 5, Chapter 1, Part 1. In summary, the districts must be proportional in geographic size and population. It appears your current versions honor that general provision. Additionally, we request that you keep the population centers as whole as reasonably possible. Please do not divide our communities when other alternatives are available to honor the size and population requirements of redistricting.

Furthermore, please keep partisan politics out of your decision-making process. Montana Code Annotated provides clear direction and 5.5.115 (3) is the area our comment is focused on.

(3) A district may not be drawn for the purposes of favoring a political party or an incumbent legislator or member of congress. The following data or information may not be considered in the development of a plan:

- (a) addresses of incumbent legislators or members of congress;
- (b) political affiliations of registered voters;
- (c) partisan political voter lists; or
- (d) previous election results, unless required as a remedy by a court.

Montanans are excited to receive an additional U.S. House member, and Montanan's take pride in our election system and representative democracy. We encourage you to follow the law in your final determination of the congressional district mapping process. Please leave politics out of the decision of where to draw the line between two congressional districts that are equal in geographic size and population.
