

EDUCATING MONTANA'S INCARCERATED POPULATION

Population Facts

- 45% of DOC inmates do not have a verifiable high school diploma or equivalent upon intake to prison (2022-23 calendar year)
- 67% of students entering DOC education programs in the 2022-23 calendar year tested at less than a fourth-grade level
- Most DOC students do not meet HiSET threshold to take HiSET (Ninth-grade level)
- Barriers to education:
 - o Mental health issues
 - o Cognitive impairments due to substance abuse
 - o Length of time out of school

Guidelines

The DOC provides adult literacy education for inmates at its secure facilities according to requirements in the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) including:

- · High school diploma/equivalent
- Special education
- Secondary school credit
- Integrated education and training
- Career pathways
- Concurrent enrollment
- Peer tutoring
- Transition to re-entry initiatives and post-release services

Inmates likely to leave prison within five years receive priority over other inmates.
