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# Child Care Overview

# Best Beginnings Program

Provides scholarships to qualified lowincome families whose children received care provided by a licensed or registered childcare provider or daycare facility

## Parental Eligibility Requirements

Families earning **less than 185% of the Federal Poverty Level.** Co-payments are determined based on the Child Care Sliding Fee Scale.

Low-income working families must meet the following **activity requirements**:

- Two-parent families working at least 120 hours per month
- Single-parent families working 60 hours per month
- •Single or two-parent families attending school or training full-time
- Single or two-parent families attending school or training part-time must meet an adjusted work requirement that considers their education/training efforts
- Teen parents attending high school or a high school equivalency program
- Childcare assistance is authorized for the parent(s) to attend work/school/training

## HB 648 in the 2023 Session

### Eligibility thresholds

Before: 150% of FPL Now: 185% of FPL

### Copayment cap

*Before: 13% Now: 9%* 

### Attendance policy

Before: A child had to attend 85% of the allotted scholarship hours each month in order for a childcare provider to be paid for that child Now: A child must attend at least one day each month to be paid the monthly authorized amount.

Appropriated \$7 million general fund in each year of the biennium beginning July 1, 2023

# STARS to Quality

Voluntary provider quality rating and improvement system that aligns quality indicators with support and incentives for childcare providers

### STARS COMPONENTS

Workforce Development

 Quality Rating and Improvement System (QRIS)

 Infrastructure to administer the programs, provide training, coaching and technical assistance, and to validate the STARS system

### STARS INCENTIVES

1. Quarterly Improvement awards

2. Tiered reimbursement percent increases (above standard state reimbursement rates) for those facilities choosing to serve Best Beginnings Scholarship Families

-Child Care and Development Block Grant

-Social Security Act's Child Care Entitlement to States

### Requirements

- -12% set aside for quality improvement activities (9% general and 3% for infant and toddler)
- -No more than 5% federal funds on administrative activities
- -70% of the remaining funds for direct services (certificates here in MT)


