Federally Managed Program (minimal state involvement) Medicare

- President Johnson signed into law in 1965 for citizens
 65 and older or who meet certain federal disability criteria;
- Funded entirely by the federal government; and
- 3. Accessible regardless of income

- By 2022, 64.5 million people received health coverage through Medicare.¹

State-Managed Insurance Programs


Medicaid

- For persons with low incomes only
- Federal program started in 1965
- Funded by both the state and federal governments
- Traditional population includes aged, disabled, and children
- Expansion population includes all others with low incomes from ages 18-64

CHIP

- Started by the federal government in Balanced Budget Act of 1997 and enacted Title XXI of the Social Security Act. CHIP is a joint statefederal partnership that provides health insurance to low-income children
- Covers children ages 0-18 above the income limitations of Medicaid and below 261% of federal poverty level





Traditional Medicaid Federal Match Rate

The Federal Medical Assistance Percentage (FMAP) calculation compares the per capita income (PCI) for each state to the U.S. PCI, while factoring in some statutory limitations. The formula is designed to ensure that a state with a PCI equal to the U.S. PCI receives an FMAP of 50%, or a federal share of 50% and a state share of 50%.

The U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services publishes FMAPs for the upcoming fiscal year in November. The 2024 FFY FMAP was published in November of 2022.



Medicaid Expansion

The expansion of Medicaid specifically targets individuals between the ages of 19-64 earning less than 138% of the federal poverty level (FPL). In 2024, this was the equivalent of \$20,783 for an individual, or \$43,056 for a family of four.


Expansion started at the mid-point of FY 2016; only six months of enrollment occurred in FY 2016.

Enrollment by Program




Medicaid Expansion Expenditures

Medicaid Expansion Expenditures FY 2020 - FY 2023




Total Medicaid Enrollment Traditional & Expanded




Medicaid Enrollment Trends

- The Families First Coronavirus Response Act (2020) gave states an additional 6.2% in traditional Medicaid FMAP in exchange for a freeze on redetermination and disenrollment for the duration of the public health emergency. Redeterminations started again in April 2023.
- 2016 Medicaid expansion begins
- 2019 Enrollment in Medicaid begins to fall
- 2020 COVID PHE increases enrollment (no redetermination)
- 2023 Redeterminations begin again, enrollment drops



State Managed Health Insurance for Children



Children's Health Insurance Program Budget and Expenditures

A state's CHIP spending is reimbursed by the federal government at a higher matching rate than the Medicaid rate. CHIP's enhanced Federal Medical Assistance Percentage rate (E-FMAP) for Montana is 74.74% in FY 2024.
